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WINDSOR PARK BEGINS ITS OWN TRAFFIC CALMING INITIATIVE

Dear Windsor Park Residents,

First, a big thank you to all of you who interrupted your amorous activities and attended our February meeting on Valentine's Day. We had a fantastic and very informative presentation by Nelson Linder, head of the Austin chapter of the NAACP.

At this meeting we also rolled out our new 'signage initiative,' about which we are very excited. The goal of this campaign is to hopefully alleviate some of the problems we've had with traffic, speeding, and the like in our hood. We have been and will continue to be dialoguing with the City and our representatives so that they can 'officially' address the problem. The thing is, these things take time and money...and lots of it.

In the meantime, as an association and a neighborhood WE need to all come together and be a little more proactive in fulfilling our community's needs. And, although our council members have been extremely proactive in getting attention drawn to the circulation and safety issues affecting this community, that does not mean that we have to wait until things work their way through city planning and the like to do something. In that spirit and as discussed at our February meeting, we are going to get signs made reminding people to slow down, respect all traffic laws, and yield to pedestrians. Will it work? We don't know, but it's worth a shot.

Thanks to two anonymous donors, we had pledges already for \$200 toward the signs before even launching the campaign. The announcement was made at the meeting on 2/14 and subsequently posted to the listserv. As of the moment I'm writing this (3pm on 2/15) we have already raised \$50 more toward the initiative. The plan is to initially buy around a hundred signs and distribute them in a manner that targets streets that are particularly problematic. There will be a recommended donation of \$3 in exchange for a sign to help offset the cost of producing them. These donations will allow us to purchase more if it seems to be working and there is a demand for them. If not, all funds raised will return to the Association and be used for other projects. We are hoping to roll out the signs in March.

But what should we put on them? Our thinking is that these signs might be more effective if there were a little variety (and a little more humor, poetry, whatever). Accordingly, we crowdsourced the verbiage to our listserv under the handle of "Traffic Calming: WPNA Signage Initiative." So far we have already received a lot of excellent suggestions—including a few poems and even a haiku! If you have a suggestion, please log into/join the listserv and post it. If you haven't done so already, you should really check the listserv out. Garage sales, lost dogs, criminal activity, cultural events: subscribing to the listserv is THE best way to stay abreast of what is going on in your community. 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March 2015 Yard of the Month

The March winners are Pat and Laquetta Shane of 5900 6214 Walnut Hill Drive. Pat closed on the house in 1999, the day after the old airport shut down.

Like many people in our area, they have adapted their yard as the summer heat has gotten more severe. In the parts of the lawn that got full sun all day the grass began to burn. These areas are now xeriscapes with well-mulched plant beds and areas with river rocks and larger rocks. Many of these areas are outlined in Texas limestone. To soften the straight lines of the house and the lot, Pat used curving lines for many of the mulched and rocky areas.

Pat started modifying his landscape in 2010 and continues to work at in the spring and the fall of the year. He has used many native plants and some adapted ones. In a bed near the house, he has irises. To one side of the house there is a Bur Oak tree. Nearer the street he has Texas Sage, Rosemary, a Crape Myrtle, Purple Heart, Lamb's Ear, and many Cacti, including Prickly Pear, Yucca and other succulents. He plans to plant more cacti and do more rock work.

He has been fortunate to get much advice and some of his stone from his neighbors. He advises the new gardener to do research to find plants that thrive in our zone. Only use plants that are heat and drought tolerant, and will tolerate occasional freezes. Of course many are natives. Now Pat never waters. His maintenance consists of raking leaves and mowing the grass that remains in the yard.

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Volunteer at Bartholomew Park for It's My Park Day

On Saturday morning, March 7, volunteers will meet at the Bartholomew Park splashpad at Greenbrook and Berkman to spruce up, refresh, rebuild, and repair our neighborhood park. Austin Parks Foundation sponsors and supports city-wide park projects on the first Saturday in March. This year there will be two projects in the park. Sprucing up Bartholomew will be led by a group from Bae Systems, and Refresh, Rebuild, and Repair will be led by Windsor Park Neighborhood Association. In addition to free t-shirts, KIND Bars, and snacks, it's a great opportunity to get to know your park and your neighbors as we work to restore the park.

To sign up, go to austinparks.org. At their website, click on It's My Park Day. Click on VOLUNTEER. Scroll through the alphabetical list of park projects to Bartholomew Park (numbers 6 and 7), and sign up. Very easy and very rewarding. We've always had an excellent turnout from all parts of Austin, so I encourage you to sign up early.

On IMPD, meet in the splashpad area at Greenbrook and Berkman, sign in, and decide which project you would like to work on. We will be weeding and pruning the landscape in the splashpad area, repairing the rain garden that attempts to control splashpad overflow, mulching trees, and landscaping in the splashpad area. We will also pick up trash along the length of the creek from Berkman to the east end of the park. We will also root collar and mulch young trees on the south side of the creek at Berkman and 51st. The Learning Trail will be prepped and re-painted. We will work to spruce up the infrastructure at the ballfields. Tools will be available, but if you have favorites, bring them clearly marked.

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Shade Installation for Toddler Playscape and Infant Swings

Thanks to Parks and Recreation Director Sara Hensley and PARD Designer DANne Williams, the color impasse has been resolved for the shades. DANne Williams met with the WPNA Executive Committee and PARD agreed to issue a waiver for the colors of playscape shades. The Executive Committee voted to use blue poles for all playscapes and a silver shade for the toddler playscape and a blue shade for the toddler swings. Both shade colors provide the maximum UV shade protection - 90+% and will make the playground area safer for our children.

The contract has been signed with USA-shade. USA-shade will prepare the engineered drawings and secure the permit. Upon receipt of the 50% deposit from WPNA funds (\$14,375), the project will be released into production. Four weeks later, USA-shade will install the structures in the park over a 4-5 day period. Then final payment will be made using our Austin Parks Foundation Grant of \$12,500 plus a final \$1,875 from WPNA funds. It's an amazing achievement for Windsor Park. Thank you all for your support.

The last phase of the project will be the securing \$18,500 to shade the larger playscape. It would be a real accomplishment if we could raise the funds in time to complete the last phase of the project in 2015. Consider donating to the playscape fund and join the 100 plus individuals and businesses who have already made generous contributions.


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

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How Can You Help Texas Schools?

Schools Committee Update by Meghan Dougherty

There is a popular idea among certain Texas politicians that public schools should be subject to the same competitive forces as private businesses. We should reward schools that work, as evidenced by high test scores, and punish schools that fail. As a result, lawmakers continue to divert aid away from public schools and increase funding to charter and private schools (so-called school choice measures).

As we enter a new year of legislative action in Austin, let's make a concerted effort to contact our lawmakers and educate them about the state of education in Texas. Here are some facts to consider:

- 60% of Texas students are low income
- 17.5% are English language learners (and the number is rising)
- By 2050, Texas will see the student population almost double, to 9.5 million

However, here's the reality:

- In inflation-adjusted dollars, public schools receive \$611 less per pupil than in 2008
- In inflation-adjusted dollars, teacher pay decreased 25% from 2002 to 2012
- State education aid dropped 25% from 2002 to 2012

The fact is, if we don't do something about education in this state soon, the numbers and the need will overwhelm us. Many private businesses already import workers (how many people do you know in Austin from other states or countries?) because they can't find the people with the right education and expertise here. This problem will only get worse.

What can you do? Contact your representatives – State Senator Kirk Watson, State Representative Dawnna Dukes, and State Board of Education Member Ken Mercer. Also, you can contact the Senate Education Committee and the House Public Education members.

Ask them to restore \$600 per pupil per year (which comes to around \$6 billion). There is currently \$8.1 billion available in general revenue. We don't even need all of it!

In addition, stay on top of new bills being introduced on testing. One that needs immediate advocacy involves helping current high school seniors who have not passed their STAAR tests, which might cost them their graduation. SB 149 will allow graduation review committees to exempt seniors from passing on STAAR by looking at the student's GPA, scores on other tests, completion of advanced courses, and review of student's projects or portfolios. This is a time-sensitive action if we want to help high school seniors graduate with their peers and begin their next stage of life.

The problem with the competitive model of education is that every competition results in winners and losers, and in this case, the losers will be the neediest students in Texas.

March 2015 Mueller Update

A 6-acre portion of the Southeast Greenway along Manor Road is expected to open in mid-March, and will include peach, pear, fig, kumquat, loquat, lemon, olive, pecan, persimmon and pomegranate trees. Signage will explain the harvest seasons for the various trees and herbs. All ponds Mueller are a part of the stormwater management system.

Austin's first Parking & Traffic Management District was approved for Mueller by the City Council on February 12th, followed immediately with a second district in an area east of I-35 near downtown. On-street metered parking will soon be installed near the Thinkery and a small area of residences will be subject to Residential Permit Parking. Please be aware that Lake Park is maintained and owned by the Mueller Property Owner's Association, and its parking lot does not fall under City regulation. Heed signs and note that parking is being monitored.

The 51st Street Vision Plan Open House has been delayed but may yet happen in March. The City hopes to have a nearby venue for this event.

According to their website (modpizza.com), Seattle-based MOD Pizza anticipates an April opening for their Mueller location, near Torchy's Tacos. If their TABC application is approved, they will also sell beer along with superfast pizza.

A Fine Arts Student Showcase, held on January 22nd, was the inaugural performance for AISD's Performing Arts Center.

Park Volunteers Make a Difference

Bartholomew Park benefits from the volunteers who contribute ongoing support to the park. One consistent group of volunteers has been the UT-Lions Club. Over the past three years, they have contributed at least three volunteer days per year. They have just completed a February 15 workday to remove invasive bamboo from the east end of the park. The emerging bamboo needs to be cut to the ground monthly during the growing season. UT-Lions will also do invasive bamboo removal on April 19 as well as volunteer for It's My Park Day on March 7.

Bae Systems, which is based near the park are also a group of repeat volunteers. This year they will be leading a project in the park on It's My Park Day.

The newly landscaped median at 290 and Berkman will also be having a workday in March to maintain, landscape, and mulch the median. Five or six volunteers make a huge difference here. In addition to the one-time mulching and planting, we also need volunteers who would care for a section of the median - weeding and trash pick-up. Hi Windsor Park! On January 6th I was proud to be sworn-in as the first Council Member representing District 4 on the new 10-1 City Council. Windsor Park is mostly split between District 1 (primarily east of Westminster Dr.) and District 4 (west of Westminster). Thanks to a neighbor’s suggestion, I’ll be writing newsletter columns regularly to keep you up to date on what I’m working on for Windsor Park and Austin as a whole.

New Public Engagement Process

I heard time and time again on the campaign trail that business at City Hall is too often directed by the few, rather than by the many. I worked relentlessly with my colleagues to remodel our legislative process to improve genuine public participation.

We successfully created brand new Council committees for every major topic you’re interested in. This new system will allow everyday Windsor Park residents to provide input earlier in the process, long before the final decisions are made or votes are cast. I will be serving as Chair of the Planning and Neighborhoods Committee, Vice Chair of the Public Safety Committee, and a member of the Economic Opportunity & Innovation and Housing & Community Development Committees. I’ll keep in touch with you through the newsletter about critical committee meetings that will affect Windsor Park residents’ futures. With these committee assignments, I’ll especially be focusing on the growing cost burden on moderate and middle-income Austinites along with public safety in our neighborhoods (including traffic safety).

First Casar Policy Victories

I was proud to partner with the Austin Public Libraries during my first weeks in office to change a policy that was preventing many Austin children and families from being able to access paper library books and electronic books. You may have also heard that there was controversy around directing affordable housing funds towards projects in parts of West Austin. I’m happy to report that the new City Council did choose to do the right thing and vote for affordable housing in neighborhoods where there are very, very few options for working people.


Keep In Touch
