Dear Neighbors:

First, I'd like to thank the management and staff at the Nomad for hosting our holiday party in December. The event was a great success. If you did not renew your membership at the party and have not done so by other means, please remember to renew your membership for 2016. Our memberships renew on a yearly basis. In 2016 I look forward to continuing to work toward finishing many of the projects we have started (and, yes, kicking off some new ones). I also look forward to opening up a dialogue as to how best to continue to enlarge and diversify our membership. Whether it be online voting; joining other councils in addition to the ANC; or doing more community outreach, I look forward to discussing these issues and others at meetings and on our list-serv in my final term as president.

Applications for the Windsor Park Scholarships for graduating seniors of Reagan high school will be due on March 31st. More information will follow in our February newsletter. These scholarships recognize and reward students who have demonstrated a commitment to civic engagement. Last year, the WPNA awarded two \$1000 scholarships. Also, although independent from the WPNA, I would encourage anyone interested in (or concerned by) issues related to development and population density to look into becoming a member of the Windsor Park Neighborhood Plan Contact Team (WPNPCT). The neighborhood contact team "is a representative group of neighborhood stakeholders charged as stewards of the Windsor Park Neighborhood Plan, to uphold the implementation of the Plan's vision, goals and recommendations, and to review and vote on all proposed amendments to the Plan." Essentially, the WPNPCT fulfills the vital service of considering all changes to the existing neighborhood plan and, in turn, advises the city as to what our community wants and needs. So, for example, if what used to be a single-family residence becomes a commercial property or a duplex the likelihood is high that a zoning change or 'up-zoning' occurred. If such a change did occur, then it most likely went through our contact team. The contact team has 31 seats. However, only 14 of those seats are currently filled. What this means is that ample opportunity exists to get involved with that group, become a voting member, and directly impact the kinds of development and growth that occur in our neighborhood. Schools Committee Update

Many of you have probably seen the school transfer issue in the news recently. Here's more detailed information, so you can be better informed.

Schools that have been frozen to transfers for 2016-17 due to over enrollment include:

- High schools: Akins, Anderson and Bowie
- Middle schools: Gorzycki, Lamar and Murchison
- Elementary schools: Baldwin, Baranoff, Barrington, Becker, Blazier, Brentwood, Casis, Clayton, Cowan, Davis, Doss, Gullett, Hill, Kiker, Menchaca, Oak Hill and Webb Primary

The Lamar MS freeze should not affect many households in our neighborhood, as many are already zoned to go there automatically if those students opt out of attending Sadler Means or Garcia.

Requests for in-district student transfers to schools that have not been frozen for the 2016–17 school year may be submitted in person or by mail to the Office of Student Services. Requests will be accepted Jan. 4–29, 2016; all requests submitted during that time will receive equal consideration.

Students who wish to attend one of the following must apply directly to that program: A magnet program at LASA or Fulmore or Kealing middle schools; an application program such as Anderson High School International Baccalaureate, Austin High School Academy for Global Studies, Lamar or Covington middle schools, or McCallum High School fine arts, Small Middle School Green Tech Academy, Ann Richards School for Young Women Leaders; or a dual-language program.

My office helped create or restore three parks for our District, supported the creation of new neighborhood associations in underrepresented parts of town, and have followed through on necessary infrastructure improvements around Windsor Park, like the upcoming traffic-calming for Corona Drive and the natural gas line necessary for heating Bartholomew Park pool year-round.

Here's what we're getting done in the last days of 2015:

Expanding Housing Opportunities

In December, City Council passed a resolution I authored to make housing desegregation a top priority for the City as it rewrites its land development rules through CodeNEXT. The desire for a compact and connected future shouldn't just mean that the streets and sidewalks need to be connected—we must have connected communities. This resolution will maximize our land planning's potential to better integrate Austin, both racially and economically. This effort, along with the Council vote I led the charge on to make it easier for homeowners to build garage apartments, were two initiatives I was proud to accomplish in 2015 to create more housing options for Austinites.

Homestead Preservation Districts

One of my top priorities on Council is making sure that Austin does not become so expensive that no working families can afford to live here. The City Council's Housing Committee has focused heavily on creating homestead preservation districts in Southeast, East, and North Austin. I proposed a strategy, supported by the Council's Housing Committee, to fund attainable and affordable housing in areas where affordability is evaporating. Funds will come from new taxes generated from some of the high-rises you see Downtown on former City of Austin properties. Some of the multi-family areas in Windsor Park are eligible for funds to rehabilitate aging properties, construct new housing at attainable prices, or create land-banks where more affordable homeownership can be supported by the City.

I'm looking forward to 2016 to continue the work that still needs to get done, and am excited to work with you to make it happen! January 2016 Yard of the Month

The January winners are Damon and Nannette Flowers of 2002 Rogge Lane. They have lived on Rogge for ten years. Three years ago they decided to revamp their front yard.

Friends helped Damon and Nannette design a low maintenance, water saving landscape. Along with help from friends, they used the free pamphlet, "Grow Green, Native and Adapted Landscape Plants," published by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and the City of Austin to help them choose plants that grow well in Austin. They replaced their St. Augustine lawn with Zoysia grass. They added a drip irrigation system to use water more efficiently. Though they and their friends did most of the work themselves, they did hire others to do some of the planting. All together it took about three months to transform their yard.

Rust colored metal borders frame their planting beds. These are their favorite part of the design because Damon and a friend from college cut, shaped, and welded the metal. They also like plants that bring color to their yard. They have Pink Skullcap, Dwarf Ruellia, and Salvia Greggii, aka Autumn Sage or Cherry Sage near the street. The same bed also has Mexican Feathergrass and Bicolor Iris. Near the house, Nanette and Damon have a bed of Knockout Roses. They also have Society Garlic, Cast Iron Plant, and Bottlebrush. Their trees include a mature Red Oak, Mexican Red Bud, Mexican Plum, Anacacho Orchid, and Desert Willow. By installing a drip irrigation system and choosing native and well adapted plants, the Flowers have cut their water use and their gardening effort. They "spend a few days every couple of months trimming, weeding and mulching. " Even so "weeding can be tedious and time consuming. "

They advise, "Just do it! It doesn't have to be perfect. Drawing out our design on paper and mixing and matching plants until we had the right depth and layout helped tremendously in the planning process. "

Springtails

Springtails are very small, jumping insects that can sometimes become a problem inside homes. Springtails are usually found in areas of moisture, so indoors they may located near potted plants, sinks, bath tubs or kitchen compost areas. These insects are typically found outside in gardens, near swimming pools or near where there is excessive moisture or standing water.

Springtails are small (about 1/16 of an inch long), wingless and come in various colors. These insects have a "tail" that latches into a space on the underside of the body that they can use to "jump" several inches into the air.

Springtails are considered a nuisance insect, but some may chew on roots and leaves of sapling plants. They usually do not cause enough damage to warrant control measures to be taken. If you have springtails in your home it points to a moisture problem that should be fixed.

Options for helping reduce springtail problems:

- Remove excessive mulch and/ or leaf litter near the home
- Change watering schedule to reduce the amount of moisture near the home
- Use fans or dehumidifiers to reduce moisture indoors
- Seal cracks, crevices, pipe & wire penetrations on the outside of the home
- Replace or repair any screening on doors and windows that is damaged
- Replace weather stripping around doors and windows that does not provide a good seal
- Suck up any indoor infestations with a vacuum

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January 2016 Mueller Update

In what has become a northeast Austin holiday tradition, the largest crowd ever attended the December 2nd 10th Anniversary of the holiday re-lighting of Mueller's former control tower. Reagan High School's drumline and the Huston-Tillotson Jazz Band entertained before Austin City Council Member Ora Houston threw the switch to illuminate the NOEL and edge lights on the tower.

Mueller's six-acre community orchard, along Manor Road east of Berkman, is now complete. Edible plantings show what is possible in our own backyards. In various seasons, the plantings will produce Loring peaches, Asian pears, cork oaks, figs, kumquats, loquats, Meyer lemons, olives, pecans, persimmons, pomegranates and a variety of herbs. Informational signage describes the harvest potential for each season. For the future, the Southeast Greenway will extend eastward with trails, a large pond complete with a boardwalk, recreational playfields, a child's play area and more native Texas landscapes. Currently under construction, the Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central Texas Bennett-Rathgeber Mentoring Center will allow the organization to better serve children and families in Central Texas. The 20,000 square foot building is in the Rathgeber Children's Village, which is at the far southeast corner of Windsor Park at 4800 Manor Road. It is on the WPNA's boundary with Mueller where Zach Scott Street has yet to be built. Named after the project's largest donors, Laura and Kyndel Bennett and Sara and Dick Rathgeber, the building's features include:

- A youth activity center for art projects, games, and workshops.
- Meeting rooms for volunteer training and education, private spaces where BBBS staff can conduct volunteer screenings, and space for community organizations to meet after-hours.
- Public and private spaces that will allow donors, families, volunteers and community members to visit BBBS' offices to learn about the programs and access information and resources while maintaining the privacy of clients being served.
- Park space behind the building for recreational activities.

BBBS hopes to open the facility by the fall of 2016.

MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR: JESSE SIMMS

Our neighbor at Gaston Place Apartments for seniors and disabled, Mr. Simms has more than a few good stories of working with greatness. Back in 1942 Jesse played on a semi pro basketball team with Jackie Robinson, who lived in Austin for a couple years before he went on to break the color barrier in professional baseball. When Jackie left Austin to play for the legendary Kansas City Monarchs he borrowed money from Jesse's best friend to get there!



After attending Tillotson College Jesse spent almost 20 years serving in The Back Room at the Austin Club, where a lot of Texas politics occurred during gin rummy card playing lunches. Legislators, lobbyists and the President of the United States were on his list of clients. Jesse laughs in telling how he was the important guy to know if you wanted a good table and the right food at what was then the most important private club in the city. "They said I was an excellent politician" he says smiling broadly.

Jesse served Lyndon Johnson long before he became the President, and had become so accustomed to approaching LBJ that he was almost tackled by the Secret Service when he was reaching to take a handshake tip from the President. But turning serious, Jesse says he personally thanked the President for the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which may have been LBJ's greatest legislative achievement, and gave Jesse the right to vote for the first time in his life.

Jesse left the Austin Club to run a program for Job Corp, taking troubled youth offenders into entry level positions and helping them get started in a career. Some of these kids were offered jail time, military enlistment, or Job Corp, so there were a few rough kids in the program. One of Jesse's jobs was to deal with those who ran afoul of the police, and he discovered on many occasions these boys were getting beat up by the arresting officers. Jesse eventually brokered a deal with the police in exchange for teaching kids how to handle themselves in public situations.

The past eight years Mr. Simms has taken on a new role as unofficial gardener of Gaston Place, which is run by the Austin Housing Authority. "I started with a shovel" he says, then points at the successful flower bushes at the end of the garden: "this is my first project." We are surrounded by a dozen big metal feed troughs which have been filled with dirt and are growing scores of herbs and vegetables. This past summer the Housing Authority granted Mr. Simms and Gaston Place these troughs to start its first ever community garden. There are 22 different residents with trough space at this time, and a list of interested parties. "It gives us something to do, and it feels good to watch plants grow from nothing." What was once a dirt lot is now a thriving garden and Jesse Simms smiles at his creation. Pretty good for someone who never grew anything before in his life.
