The loss of Gus' garage in our neighborhood is just one of the many casualties this year, though ironically not as a result of COVID-19. The departure happens at a time of transition to new ownership and a proposed redevelopment to the Windsor Village shopping center. We are not aware of the negotiations with the existing landlord and how the transition of leases to the new ownership took place, but I do wish the circumstance was not resulting in the loss of one of our cherished and successful small businesses.

It's going to be gloomy on the corner of Briarcliff and Westminster without Gus and his crew. For many, seeing the classic cars is one of the highlights of the neighborhood. Without a doubt, the aesthetics fit the context of our vernacular like a glove, but what patrons will likely miss the most is Gus' neighborly approach to service.

My personal experience with Gus and his team (entrusted with my husband's "baby" - his first ever vehicle, an '88 Dodge Ram he still drives today) involved many moments where Gus has gone above and beyond. I have also witnessed him taking special care of some of our legacy neighbors and their older vehicles. In the case of long-time resident Rosaena Resendez (a patron and regular of Gus' Garage), her car wouldn't start on her way to an appointment - she called Gus and he was there in 10 minutes to troubleshoot and get her on her way. "I don't know what I'm going to do without him here," she said.

Gus is a fellow neighbor and often walked to work from his residence in Windsor Park. I see Gus' Garage as an encouraging example of the vision of living and working in your neighborhood. It is something I hope the new owner will be mindful of as they find inspiration for the future redevelopment of Windsor Village.




## Lyndon B. Johnson (LBJ) Early College High School

## Yard of the Month – 6708 Haney Drive

Nick and Louise Connolly of 6708 Haney Drive are the January winners. We took a chance on this yard because we were not sure how any possible freezes would affect the yard. We wanted some color and some color did survive.

The Connollys moved to Windsor Park 30 years ago, then moved to Haney 27 years ago. They called their first garden on Haney “the Money Pit” because everything died. Walking around the neighborhood and talking to their neighbors gave them many ideas and much good advice.

They have a Sago Palm, a Sky Flower, which so far is has not been frozen to the ground, a Belinda’s Dream Rose Bush, Sedum, Ghost Plant, Skullcap, Mexican Honeysuckle, and Chinese Fringe Tree, Maidenhair Vine. Near the house there is Pomegranate and a Knockout Rose. In a circular plot there are Snapdragons, Dianthus, a Sweet Olive, a Wax Myrtle, Arabian Jasmine, Meadow Sage, and Wildflowers.

They also have a cedar planter with Pansies, Grape Hyacinths, and Stock. Another planter has Portulacas, Ginger Plants, Pentas and Begonias. In front of this planter there is a Yaupon Holly filled with berries. Nick made these planters and the welcoming front porch where he and Louise can visit with their neighbors and watch the birds, bees, and butterflies play. Nick and Louise have also gotten some extra plants from them like Lobelia and Coreopsis. Now that the yard is well established, they water their shrubs and weed the yard when necessary.

The Connollys will get a \$50.00 gift certificate from Shoal Creek Nursery. Right now, Shoal Creek is remodeling, but they are open and have a good supply of plants, pots, and equipment. 
