September 2021 Presidents Letter

It's hard to imagine that September is here and students are back to school. Though sadly, due to the recent rise in covid cases from the Delta variant, COVID precautions are still in place and families and teachers must keep up with guidelines. We wish all of our students, families, teachers, and administrators a safe and productive year.

At our last WPNA meeting, we had two special guests, Emily Sawyer and Jen Cregar, join to discuss another topic that is top of mind for our schools – equity. And more specifically, equitable PTA funding. One piece of information that was highlighted from the AISD Board Information Session as a reason behind this decision around PTA funding was the unintended consequences surrounding Federal access to Title I school funding as a district overall- something I wasn't aware of, though I admit I have a lot to learn on the subject. Another takeaway from the conversation that I found equally as important to the information referenced was the personal experiences shared. Emily recognized (from her own experience as a parent at Blanton) that most parents are just trying to help. There is a sense of openness from the conversation that I appreciated by acknowledging the wide range of feelings on the subject (including hard feelings) and the encouragement of all perspectives getting together to discuss this important and complicated issue. I also want to reiterate a big Thank-You to our Audit committee for performing the 2019-2020 Financial Audit. 

CLIMATE CORNER: Climate-friendly development guidelines

As Windsor Park grows more popular, new apartments are being planned and we are working to make them climate friendly. The Contact Team, which represents WPNA on the details of new development, has kindly welcomed our input. To guide future projects after Windsor Village, the Contact Team is preparing a criteria document for evaluating project plans which can also be used as an ask list to let developers know what we want.

In the buildings themselves, we seek features such electric utilities. To get the deepest effect, we refer to LEEDS and the City of Austin green building standards. Outside the buildings, we seek to avoid construction of unnecessary parking, while including infrastructure for electric charging to be installed when needed. Crape myrtle bark scale

Crape myrtles are a popular landscape tree in parts of Texas, prized for their beauty. While this tree has been relatively maintenance free for years, that is no longer the case now that crape myrtle bark scale (CMBS) has been found in Texas.

Crape myrtle bark scales are small, wingless insects, pinkish in color and covered with a white, velvety covering. When looking at the bark of an infested tree, check for round to oval shaped white velvety insects. If you puncture one with a toothpick, it will exude a pink substance. When inspecting crape myrtles for CMBS, look along trunks and limbs, as well as smaller twigs and branches found towards the top of the tree. You'll want to look for scale insects and sooty mold. Sooty mold is a black colored fungus that grows on honeydew. Honeydew is an excretion from scale insects (and other small, soft-bodied insects such as aphids and mealybugs).

Heavily infested crape myrtles have CMBS that produce copious amounts of honeydew on the tree and surrounding area which leads to growth of sooty mold, turning landscape plants and the surrounding area (or items underneath infested trees) black. Infested crape myrtles produce fewer and smaller blooms which may be difficult to tell unless you have an uninfected tree to compare. Only male crape myrtle bark scales fly. Once CMBS are in an area, they can move onto nearby trees.

Control options are varied for CMBS. There are predators and parasites that attack and eat CMBS, such as ladybugs, but this may awhile for you to see control and the scale insect population may outgrow the population of the predators.

Pesticide treatment for crape myrtle bark scale can be done with either a contact spray or a systemic. Systemic treatments should be applied earlier when crape myrtle leaves are budding out. Systemics such as imidacloprid and dinotefuran are best used as a soil treatment in March so they are taken up by the tree and in place for the crawler population that emerges in April-May. These products should be used when trees are NOT in bloom to protect pollinators.

If you notice crape myrtle bark scale infesting your trees late in the season (approximately July and on), then you can use a high-pressure water spray to knock the scale insects off the tree. Another option is to get a scrub brush and dip it into a bucket of soapy water and wash the insects of the trunk and branches of the trees. September 2021 Mueller Update

At the August 10th Mueller Commission meeting, staff shared information that the City and AISD have reached an agreement that will allow a construction to start on the northeast middle school. Negotiations continue to reach a full solution for the land transfer, though the fall semester of 2023 will likely be the earliest possible opening date. In 2004, the City and Catellus signed the Mueller Master Developer Agreement providing 10 acres at no cost for a school site at Mueller. However, new legislation on the conveyance of land ownership between governmental entities (like the City & AISD) was passed in 2011, apparently without grandfathering existing agreements.

An August 11th Austin Business Journal item announced renewed interest by the Teacher Retirement System of Texas in moving from their downtown location to Mueller at 1900 Aldrich Street in the heart of Mueller's business district. No longer looking at the Berkman & 51st Street block, TRS wants to purchase the nearly completed Shorenstein Building and a yet-to-come adjacent building directly across Aldrich from BD Riley's for \$300M± to consolidate it's 500 employees at one location. Deferred maintenance on their 1000 Red River building is estimated to cost up to \$75M, but the location's proximity to the Capitol might bring an estimated \$100M.

Mueller resident Gabrielle Thomas won an individual bronze medal and a team silver medal at the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo. She has a neurobiology & global health policy degree from Harvard, and is now pursuing a graduate degree in public health from UT. She is the third-fastest woman of all time in the Olympic 200 meters at 21.61 seconds, set at the 2020 US Olympic trials.

Currently, Mueller parks are open for recreational use, but masking and social distancing are strongly recommended. Due to the current health situation, all Mueller event approvals will follow the City of Austin's event guidelines for Fall 2021. Note that all event dates are subject to last minute cancellations due to a change in the City's health status.

The Robert Mueller Municipal Airport Plan Implementation Advisory Commission will next meet on Tuesday, September 14, 2021 at 6PM. Texas Open Meeting Act exemptions allowing virtual meetings during the pandemic are set to expire on September 1st, but may be renewed by the Governor. Prices have also seemed to stabilize a little (not dropping, just selling for 10-11% over list price, instead of 25-50%), which is a little closer to "normal" Austin.

The Windsor Park median sales price of July 2020 was \$435,000. In one year's time, we experienced a 53% increase.



Local Business Profile: Muscle Maintenance Company

A couple of years ago an old shoulder injury flared up again and made it impossible for me to lift my arm above shoulder level. It took the guidance of a fellow Windsor Park resident, and a few weeks of exercises and stretches, to fully regain my arm's range of motion. My good fortune began with a chance meeting at the Mueller HEB between my wife and Marc Frazier, our trainer from many years ago. It turned out Marc lived a short walk from our house and had expertise in healing musculoskeletal injuries like the one I had.



Ever since Marc graduated from high school, he has surrounded himself with gym equipment and with people working on improving their strength, balance and flexibility. In the 1980s Marc turned his fascination with skeletal mechanics and anatomy to help people walk, run, climb, jump, lift and swim in a safe

and efficient way. He takes a holistic approach and incorporates elements of therapeutic exercises, strength training, massage therapy and yoga when working with clients. On my quest to heal my shoulder, I quickly came to appreciate his familiarity with the human anatomy and how he could sense the connectedness of every bone and muscle in the body. Each exercise and stretch he prescribed came with much appreciated explanation of how it helps my shoulder heal and stay healthy. In Marc's way of thinking, healing has to come from the person and his role is to merely provide the tools and knowledge for the healing to happen.

Unsurprisingly, Marc's ways of working with his clients changed dramatically when the pandemic hit. Working one-on-one in a public gym was no longer an option. But his longstanding philosophy of encouraging his clients to take charge of their own wellbeing turned out to help overcome some of the pandemic-related restrictions. Most clients either already owned enough basic equipment or were willing to acquire it. With equipment at hand, Marc

and his clients found ways to work remotely. Lately however, with the restrictions easing, Marc is beginning to see clients face-to-face again both at gyms and at clients' homes. (Although, due to a resurgence of COVID cases in Travis County, some of the earlier restrictions may be put back in place.)

Marc, a native Austinite, has lived in Windsor Park for over 16 years and he says this neighborhood feels like home. He appreciates Windsor Park's convenient location and is grateful for the influx of new amenities. He puts some of his non-work hours to good use by volunteering at the Texas Memorial Museum as a guide. Spending time at the museum allows him to indulge in his fascination with all things bones and animal anatomy; and volunteering puts one of Marc's guiding life-principles to work: "to help people make their time on earth a little bit better."

September 2021 Yard of the Month

The September Yard of the Month winner is April Rohlich. She has lived at 1303 Westmoor Drive for 8 years and is a member of WPNA.

As an early project, April had to remove a 180-year-old red oak that had lived out its life. April spread the rotten roots as fertilizer to begin what became a “pocket prairie” with a variety of plants and mushrooms, and the animal life that they attract.

The plants include Big Muhly, Four-Nerve Daisies, Black-Eyed Susans, Inland Sea Oats, Mexican Bush Sage, Rock Roses, Purple Coneflowers, Rosemary, Gregg Mistflowers, Gulf Muhly, White Guara, Wax Myrtle, Yaupon Holly, and Green Antelope Horn Milkweed. When mature these plants require little water and less work. They attract all sorts of pollinators and other wildlife ranging from bees, dragonflies, beetles, spiders, birds to the occasional Texas Spring Lizard. Her Milkweed is a spectacular attractor. April has seen it host the complete Monarch life cycle; egg, caterpillar, chrysalis, and adult. Before they are adults, Monarchs can only use the milkweed. Adult Monarchs can drink nectar from several flowers including the milkweed.

In 2019, April hired a landscaping company to put in the rock borders separating the yard into distinct areas. She chose native plants and would advise the beginner to do the same. That cuts down on work and increases the chance of success.

April will get a \$50.00 gift certificate from Shoal Creek Nursery. Shoal Creek has finished remodeling, and they have a good supply of plants, pots, and equipment; it is a pleasure to visit and talk with the knowledgeable staff. If you like a certain yard, or more than one, tell us. We cannot visit every yard in the neighborhood each month and we appreciate nominations. Send your nomination(s) to WPNA YOMC. P.O. 
