I'm proud of so many things this neighborhood has accomplished. As we wrap up 2018, here are a few of our accomplishments:

- We have organized an Annual Neighborhood Block Party two years in a row.
- We won a Neighborhood Partnering Program grant to fund landscaping along Berkman Drive.
- We advocated and communicated with the City and Greg Casar to implement improvements along Berkman Drive.
- We organized an inter-neighborhood candidate forum for both the Texas House District 25 primary race in the spring and the City Council District 1 race this fall.

December 2018 Yard of the Month

The December winner is Alan Coy of 5108 Waterbrook Drive. He has lived in his house for 37 years. Several yards in the neighborhood have inspired him. When I visited with him, he talked a lot about one of his neighbors who had won a few years ago.

He has a large Oak, a Catalpa Tree, Mountain Laurel, and Crape Myrtles. Both the catalpa and the mountain laurel are Texas natives. Though the crape myrtles are not blooming now, their trunks are beautiful. He also has several Sago Palms.

His smaller plants include Foxtail Fern, light blue Plumbago, Ruellia, and pink and rose colored Salvia Coccinea. He manages to keep the ruellia corralled so that it does not take over the yard. Alan also has many plants of that popular variety, "I knew what it was when I planted it." One of those is a groundcover with yellow flowers. No, it is not horseherb; both the leaves and the flowers are larger than horseherb. He also uses Monkey Grass as a groundcover. He has no grass, just plantings, some large,

some small, and groundcover with mulched trails dividing them.

It took him the last five years to develop the current design. He uses collected rain water to water his plants. Alan much prefers trimming trees and shrubs to mowing lawns. He suggests paying great attention to light. See if the plant is happy with the light that it receives. If not, move it.

Under his mailbox at the street, he has a fascinating wooden owl. He said that it is about 50 years old, but told me no more about it.

MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR: Mac McKaskle

Our neighbor in Windsor Park on and off since the Reagan Administration, Mac McKaskle is currently living on Wellington Drive, but has fond memories of living on Ridgeway and Patton back in the day when he was chef around town. These days Mac is retired and donating his time as Street Youth Director for a homeless outreach coalition of churches in the University area called Micah 6, headquartered in University Baptist Church, and providing meals on Sundays to the homeless kids in the area.

What started out as choosing a place for Mac to worship, ultimately became a second calling. “The church had this dinner program set up, and when I retired as a chef I took over the chef duties for the homeless program.” That was four years ago. Mac is now an expert on our city’s homeless situation. “The homeless are scattered all over the city because they keep being moved by the police. The University Administration has put a lot of pressure on the city to get rid of the homeless on west campus. Police crackdown creates a circle of hardship for the homeless that the city perpetuates.”



After many decades of helping the homeless, a dozen churches, synagogues and mosques got together to make a new program that has a specific goal in fighting homelessness. “My organization deals with the 25 to 30 year old homeless kids. It’s a lot easier to get them off the drugs and the street after turning 25 because their brains have developed and they can make more rational decisions. We can reach them.”

One way to do that is to provide a Sunday evening meal, every Sunday, that homeless kids can rely upon. “It’s a myth that these kids choose the street. Most of them come out of the foster system, which is bad, with the beatings and abuse and rape. These kids have bad childhoods and when they are released by the state at 18 they have almost no skills on how things work in life. They just need help in normal things like how to get an apartment and set up utilities.”

Mac says instead of his team trying to be buddies, they are instead being a grandparent, which is an interesting phenomenon I think, with the retired generation giving their wisdom and knowledge to young people, with sometimes inspiring results. “There are about 80 homeless youth on the street right now today. As we find them and work with them we are getting 85% off the street. They go from dirty, half dressed, and angry to good jobs making a living. It happens all the time. It’s a major accomplishment to get off the street.”

The Micah 6 program began 15 years ago as a one day a week food pantry at University Baptist. In 2012 the pantry moved to University Presbyterian and the Youth Drop In Center was opened in U. Baptist, open every Sunday from 2 to 6, with access to computers, games, and social networking. “We don’t preach to them. We only talk about spirituality in a non-religious way.”

That’s because there are three religions working together on this project and no one wants to be competing with the other. Micah 6 had a special pre-Thanksgiving dinner bringing together all the faiths in one room. “There’s something about an Imam giving a call to prayer in a Baptist Church. His beautiful voice filling the room. It was awe inspiring.” They fed 250 people on that night. The prep cooks came from Agudas Acheem Synagogue, the volunteer waiters came from several mosques, and Mac was in charge of the kitchen. [Continues on page 8]

December 2018 Mueller Update

As 2018 ends and the 20th anniversary of aviation ceasing at Mueller nears, here's a brief look back at the redevelopment's financial history, and also what's to come in the not too distant future.

Mueller has been quite successful for the City of Austin. The joint venture with Catellus minimized risk to the City, and the project managed to weather the economic downturn of 2008-2010 without major setbacks. Mueller's infrastructure construction is funded by land sales to Catellus and re-sales to developers, and by Tax Increment Financing (TIF) using property and sales taxes generated at Mueller. All Mueller bonds will be repaid by 2032, and as of 2017, Mueller's assessed value was \$1.15 billion, already exceeding the 2004 full build-out estimate of \$1 billion.

Several entities and many Mueller residents are beginning to anticipate the transition process as the project approaches build-out. With numerous mixed-use properties yet to be come, Catellus anticipates it will be around for at least another three years. Once they leave, plans call for the Mueller Commission to be replaced by a Mueller contact team, and the Property Owner's Association, which includes both residential and commercial owners, will take over many of Catellus' functions. Though the 2017 AISD bonds included a Mueller school, the District has yet to begin planning for it, and it is highly unlikely a school will open before 2023. With Mueller's population growth, redistricting after the 2020 census, from congressional districts to voting precincts, will likely impact Mueller and some adjacent areas. As in any other Austin neighborhood, the City will manage transportation issues and maintain all publicly owned streets.

Due to issues with overhead utilities, neither Zach Scott Street at Manor Road nor Tilley Street at E. 51st Street will open by the end of 2018, but should do so in early 2019. Visit the Mueller Austin Facebook page for more information about Mueller.

Newly-elected City Council Members will take office in January and begin making their appointments to City boards and commissions. If you're interested in serving, submit an application to the City Clerk in person or online. Then inform City Council Members of your interests and availability. There is no requirement to live in a Council Member's district for appointment.

With no December meeting, the Robert Mueller Municipal Airport Plan Implementation Advisory Commission will next meet at 6PM, Tuesday January 8, 2019 at the Britton, Durst, Howard & Spence Building (Chestnut Community Center), 1183 Chestnut Avenue. 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

Homelessness is complicated. It's not just driven by addiction and mental health. Mac thinks the spiraling cost of housing is a major contributor. "There is a huge need out there" he laments. Micah 6 opens a Freeze Shelter on any night that temperatures drop below freezing. "One of the kids told me that no one will starve to death in Austin, but you can freeze to death." It's all about helping where it is most needed. "We try to meet the kids where they are. They really respect us, and appreciate what we are doing for them. I am very impressed with the character it takes for these kids to survive and then succeed."

Thanks to the It's My Park Day mulch crew for mulching trees near the parking lot on Greenbrook, cleaning up the entry beds, clearing the butterfly garden, and re-painting the Learning Trail. Meg Brooks not only led the Saturday projects, but she also gathered a crew to finish the job. It's bright and colorful - see the photos on page 11.

Several interested Windsor Park volunteers from Parks, Revitalization, and Beautification Committees met with Scott Sinn, Parks and Recreation Park Designer to review the plans for the long-anticipated trail between the splash pad and the pool and a branch to the corner of 51st and Berkman. Trail building will begin in mid-2019 and hopefully be completed by fall 2019. This is a long-anticipated trail and will make trips between the pool and splashpad safer and more pleasant.

Parks Committee is beginning to think about new projects that will enhance and make Bartholomew more user-friendly. One suggestion is a trail through the park from Sunnybrook to new 51st and Tilley Street intersection. Also, Central Northeast Austin Kiwanis will be making a significant donation to the playscape shades from their successful Butterfly Festival. That may be the impetus that we need to re-start fundraising to complete shades for playscape and swings. WPNA voted not to join Amplify Austin for 2019, so we'll be turning again to neighborhood residents. More than 100 of us have donated to the first phase, which covered the toddler swings and playscape. [Cont. on page 11]

Excluding Pests from your Home

When the weather turns towards autumn and leads into winter, many pests start looking for a cozy place which can often lead them inside your home. By performing a thorough inspection, you can locate areas where these pests may enter and stop them before they become a problem.

Inside the home, look around doors and windows when there is light outside; if you see light around roods or windows, then there isn't a good seal and weather stripping should be replaced. The attic should be inspected for holes or entry points for small mammals such as rats, mice, and squirrels. Attic vents should be covered with stainless steel screening to block animals from entering. Outside, inspect the perimeter of the home for any cracks and crevices in the foundation that should be sealed. Locate pipe and wire penetrations that enter the structure and repair any areas that allow pests to enter the home.

Ideas on how to exclude pests from your home:

- Trim back or prune any trees and shrubs that touch or overhang the home
- Seal pipe & wire penetrations with copper mesh, sealant, or expanding foam
- Replace weather stripping around doors and windows if there is not a good seal
- Repair or replace any window screens with holes
- For homes with brick or stone facades, stuff weep holes with steel wool* or copper mesh
*steel wool will rust if it gets wet, so do not use on light colored façades
- Inspect all furniture, boxes, and bags for pests before carrying them into the home
- Inspect all plants for insect pests before bringing them into the home
- Do not store firewood inside the home, against the outside walls, or near doors
- Use sheet metal, hardware cloth, or steel wool to seal any areas where animals have chewed to enter the home**
**make sure animal is not in the home or you'll seal it inside!





