Dear Neighbors,

I've got some great news to report: at our last general meeting on October 10th Pastor Lee Lever of the Austin Mennonite Church presented the WPNA with a check for \$650. These monies were raised at the Pancake Fundraiser Breakfast held at the church in September. This money will go toward our Reagan Scholarship Fund. Last year we were able to award two \$1000 scholarships. We are hopeful to be able to award more scholarships this year. In other news: at our last meeting we also had a very informative presentation by Jessica Castilleja of the Workers Defense Project. The Workers Defense Project is a non-profit, membership-based organization that aims to empower low-income workers to achieve fair employment through education, direct services, organizing, and strategic partnerships. Ms. Castilleja's presentation focused primarily on the Build It Better program. This program aims to improve the safety conditions for construction workers, secure them benefits and protections while on the job, and insure that the wages these workers are receiving are fair. As announced at the last meeting, we are still in the process of organizing our annual holiday party. The holiday party is always held on the second Saturday in December. Our hope is that this will increase attendance and make for a more successful potluck lunch.




Berkman Drive Transportation Survey Results




What intersection along Berkman Drive is most in need of a pedestrian crossing?

For The Trees

Right Tree, Right Place

With summer finally behind us, it's a great time of year to consider planting trees. Arborists often use the phrase, "right tree, right place," meaning: plant a tree species that is fit for your property and plant it in a place that gives it the best chance to thrive over its lifetime (which might be well over a hundred years). Below is an abbreviated guide to help you if you're interested in growing our urban forest here in Windsor Park. For more detailed info check out: http://texastreeplanting.tamu.edu

Large trees

Live oaks – Ubiquitous, but still one of my favorite trees for its hardiness, beauty, and year-round green Chinkapin oaks – Tough tree tolerant of many soil types, sawtoothed leaves, acorns provide food for wildlife or humans Mexican white oaks (aka Monterrey oaks) – semi-evergreen, faster growth rate than most other oaks Bur oaks – Slower growing, but long-lived and tolerant of diverse growing conditions

Small to Medium trees

Texas redbud – May be single or multi-trunked, showy reddish-pink blooms in spring Mountain laurel – Evergreen with fragrant purple flowers in spring Palo Verde – Airy, open canopy provides dappled shade and yellow flowers Anacacho orchid – Delicate leaves and white blooms, beneficial for butterflies and bees Mexican plum – White blooms in spring, fruit for birds or industrious humans (jams and jellies)

Fruit trees

In Central Texas, your best bet is to stick with the P's: Peaches, Plums, Pears and Persimmons. These are proven winners and require less care than apples, citrus and other favorite fruits. The Natural Gardener is a great source for quality stock in the winter, as well as all the information you'll need to plant and care for them.

Where to plant

For saving on your electric bill, consider planting on the south and west sides of your house where trees will grow to create shade for windows and roofs. Plant at least 10 feet off the curb and consider a tree's size at maturity when planting near structures. Trees close to houses, sheds, fences, powerlines and other trees will require more pruning and will cost more to maintain over time. Some may even grow to an extent that removal is the only option.

Over 600 million pairs of shoes are sent to landfills in the US every year. Redemptive Work is paid by the pound for those shoes, which are used in developing countries to provide work, either refurbishing them for sale or breaking them down for raw materials to start businesses. Redemptive Work uses the money they get to provide coaching and assistance for people in Austin who experience barriers getting into and remaining in the workforce. 



Transportation survey, continued from p. 2

November 2015 Mueller Update



Unlike the surrounding neighborhoods with multitudes of churches, schools, and public library branches or recreation centers, Mueller has no such facilities, and none are planned. Churches are allowed, but the land and development costs are prohibitive. Several private spaces are available, but many charge fees, have time restrictions or are not large enough. Mueller residents are beginning a conversation on public meeting space at Mueller, not only for the Mueller Neighborhood Association, but for smaller book or other social groups. Mueller Central and the historic Browning Hangar are planned to be sold for commercial uses. The iconic terminal tower has many safety and accessibility issues, but no specific plans for the immediate area at its base. As Mueller nears its anticipated 2020 build-out, questions about the future of these sites will be posed at upcoming Mueller and RMMAPIAC meetings. In the interim, they are open to offers from surrounding neighborhoods for space. Click the "Contact MNA" tab at http://www.muellerneighborhood.org/

Principals from Andrews, Blanton and Harris elementary schools spoke at WPNA's October meeting. As with AISD in general, enrollment is down a bit at our neighborhood elementary schools. However, within Mueller's attendance zone for Blanton, homes have only begun to be occupied for a bit over two years. Most of the residential units remaining to be built at Mueller also fall within the area tracking to Blanton, Garcia/Means and Reagan. There are Mueller students now attending Blanton, and more will come in the next few years. Since the failure of their 2013 bond proposition for a northeast school, AISD has been considering other schooling options on the Mueller land set aside for a school. Any facility is still several years from reality, as the site currently has no infrastructure. It is not anticipated that any AISD or joint venture charter or private school would limit its enrollment to Mueller residents.

The Thinkery hosts a Community Night every Wednesday from 4 PM to 8 PM - admission is the donation of your choice. Free parking is available in the Town Center Parking Garage on McBee Street. More information is at http://thinkeryaustin.org/ events/ The 10th Annual Mueller Tower Lighting Ceremony is scheduled for Tuesday, December 1st, featuring music, holiday treats, family activities and of course, the NOEL lighting on the former control tower. The location will be the vacant lot on the west side of the 3900 Block of Berkman Drive, just a bit southwest of the tower. The NOEL tradition dates back to the 1960's, but was dropped after aviation ceased at Mueller in 1999 until Catellus revived it in 2005!

The RMMAPIAC next meets on November 10, 2015 at 6PM in Meeting Room 1 of the Carver Library, 1161 Angelina Street. There is no December RMMAPIAC meeting, so the following meeting is January 12, 2016. Please send Mueller-related questions & comments to bc-Rick.Krivoniak@austintexas.gov.

November 2015 Yard of the Month Sara Jane Lee

The November winner is Stephanie Meyer of 1406 Hillcrest Lane. Over the last year she has replaced her lawn. She would like to thank her neighbors for donating leaves and cardboard for her project. She also appreciates their encouraging comments. Her landscape now is composed of beautiful and useful plants.

Now her front yard is a cornucopia of flowers, vegetables, and herbs anchored by fruit and other trees. She has Fig, Pomegranate, Mulberry, Pecan, Pear, Plum, Mandarin, Meyer lemon, and Loquat trees. She has just added a Tea tree and a Button bush. One of her favorite plants is the Bird of Paradise, which fixes nitrogen in the soil and attracts bees and other pollinators. Milkweed is food for the Monarch butterfly and provides a place for them to lay their eggs. She also has Texas Sage, Chile piquen, Lamb's ear, Zinnia, Impatiens, Purple coneflower, Lantana, Silver ponyfoot, Fountain grass, and Turk's cap. Her favorite vegetable is the Rainbow chard, which is nutritious, requires little care, and tastes delicious.

Starting last November she started removing the grass. Because a tiller would compact the compact the heavy clay soil, she used a spading fork. She also hand dug the berms and swales that run perpendicular to the water runoff. She filled in the swales with fallen wood and leaves and covered them with pine straw and hardwood mulch. The result works like a sponge. She amended the topsoil with compost and mulch. To conserve water, she uses drip irrigation on a timer. She also uses lots of mulch.

November message from CM Greg Casar

Thanks to everyone who attended our community meeting on Transportation in September. At that meeting, we were joined by Mobility Committee Chair Ann Kitchen and District 50 State Representative Celia Israel (who serves on the State House's Transportation Committee) who agreed to work together towards improving North Lamar. I think this is a great step forward for the long term work to address transportation needs in District 4.

Speed Bumps Coming to Corona

I was happy to work with the Transportation Department to use my office's remaining budget dollars for FY2015 to provide initial funding for the long-awaited speed bumps at Corona Drive. Over 80% of the neighbors on the street organized and brought the request for traffic calming devices forward, and my office and the Transportation Department heard loud and clear! This project will move forward to improve the quality of life for Windsor Park neighbors – you can look forward to these speed bumps being installed very soon.

Standardizing voting hours for all City facilities

In October, I authored and sponsored a resolution to bring consistency to voting hours at City facilities during early voting, especially at locations on the east side of I-35. During this last election, several voters contacted me about having trouble voting in the morning hours at Gus Garcia Recreation Center. Our City staff has been working hard to restore hours at City-owned facilities to pre-recession hours, and has already implemented plans to ensure all of our City facilities that are election locations are consistent with County-wide early voting hours beginning in 2016.

Austin Leading Texas in Clean, Affordable Solar Energy

Solar prices have hit a historic low and Austin moved to benefit from this. This month, City Council initiated the purchase of up to 450 megawatts of solar and directed Austin Energy to bring another 150 megawatts by 2019. This purchase puts Austin into a national leadership role in clean, reliable, and affordable solar energy. Experts have concluded that these new solar deals will save ratepayers money for decades to come, along with helping our environment.

MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR: WHIT WILLIAMS

Our neighbor on Glenvalley Drive since 1999 with wife Ashley (former WPNA newsletter editor), Whit is recipient of the 2014 Mississippi Review Poetry Prize, and his collection, Backmasking, won the 2013 Robert Phillips Poetry Chapbook Prize from Texas Review Press. He was also featured in the 2014 University of North Texas Kraken Reading Series, and his poems have been published in numerous literary journals. His latest collection, Lost in the Telling, is available at Malvern Book Store. And oh, by the way, he is guitarist for the rock band Cotton Mather.

Whit first came here as a Windsor Park librarian, back when libraries lived in strip shopping centers! (Current WP library built in 2000). Although he now works at a UT library, he still puts in a weekly volunteer night at our library. Old habits are hard to break!

Whit first tried poetry in college, and discovered he was not all that good at it. Later as a rock band guitarist he was writing lyrics on a regular basis, but as Whit puts it, rock lyrics are not poetry. It wasn't until 2008 while working with a poetry grad student at a UT library, Whit was encouraged to pick up the pen and try poetry again. (yes, that rhymes on purpose!) For some reason he suddenly got the knack for it.

These days he tries to write every day, sitting by the window on quiet weekend mornings on Glenvalley, listening to the voices in his head, "tapping into the small little universe in my brain." Most people think a poet waits around for the muse, but Whit says he doesn't depend on inspiration, for it is fleeting. The real writing comes because you "sit and do the work."


"When I started, I kind of liked being surprised at what pops into my head, and when you get to writing and like how the words come out, you don't have time to wonder where that came from. Fall is in the air, students are busy with their studies, but quiet plans of Halloween and Thanksgiving are being whispered in the Blanton hallways...fun and family time is on everyone's mind.

Our Blanton Adult exercise class is still going strong, they meet each Monday and Tuesday in the gym from 3:15 to 4:15 p.m. everyone is invited to come join us in becoming fit and healthy. One of our own Blanton staff members is leading this class and everyone participating seems to enjoy it greatly. Camp Fire is back with their 'Play to Learn' program that is offered to parents and pre-kinder students not in school. They are learning about literacy and becoming more prepared to join us when they are of school age.

November 1 Daylight Savings Time ends, so set your clocks back an hour and enjoy the extra sleep. We have two holidays in November where there is no school: November 11 for Veteran's Day, and Nov 25-27 for Thanksgiving.

On November 11, the ACE program will host a presentation for parents and friends of the third grade group who have been attending after school classes on architecture. The presentation will begin at 6:00 p.m. and will show everyone in attendance what the students have been learning from the instructors. ACE will also continue collecting t-shirts for the 'T-Shirts for Hunger Program' which will be an ongoing activity. The shirts are collected to make grocery bags to be used by the food bank when handing out food to the needy. Clean, gently used (no holes) t-shirts may be put in the t-shirt barrel at school and ACE will see they are delivered to Travis County. The best sizes are youth large, adult small and adult medium - long-sleeve, short-sleeve or tank tops. We welcome our community to participate in this activity.
