

Mueller Update

Now underway at Mueller's Mary Elizabeth Branch Park (2201 Aldrich Street, across from Kerby Lane Cafe) is an events pavilion that will also be a new & slightly larger home for Mueller's farmer's market. Designed by The Lawrence Group architects, the pavilion will have three walls of floor-to-ceiling glass, huge ceiling fans & bi-folding overhead doors offering a covered yet open-air option in nice weather, and efficient HVAC for closed comfort in its 19,800+ square feet. There will also be concession facilities, two sets of unisex restrooms, and more power outlets for vendors. The location is more centrally accessible to Mueller residents, and will be served by Aldrich Street district parking garages. Weather permitting, construction is estimated to be completed by the end of the year.

The Browning Hangar, current home to the farmer's market, has always been intended for use in some other commercial capacity, yet to be determined. Most likely to come with the new use will be enclosure for all-year use, additional parking, restrooms, and possibly kitchen or catering facilities.

\$1,000 WPNA SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY

For the 6^h year, The Windsor Park Neighborhood Association Schools Committee has collected funds to offer AISD graduating seniors who live within the Windsor Park boundaries an opportunity to apply for an \$1000 scholarship for attending a 2- or 4-year college in the following year. The 2020-2021 scholarships are offered to all Windsor Park seniors, graduating from any AISD high school. Preference will be given to Northeast, LBJ, and LASA seniors.

Eligibility Requirements: A student must meet the following minimum requirements:

- Be an AISD senior who will be attending a 2- or 4-year college in 2020-21.
- Currently reside in the Windsor Park boundaries (map online)
- Have at least a 2.5 overall GPA or have demonstrated GPA growth over time.

Austin Creative Reuse (ACR) - Welcome to the neighborhood

By the time you read this, Austin Creative Reuse (ACR) will have moved into its new digs on Wheless Ln. Many Windsor Park residents have been long time supporters and enthusiastic shoppers at ACR. Now that it's in the neighborhood, many more will likely follow suit.

For those who don't know, ACR is a fun place for artists, crafters, and DIY-types to find inspiration and low-cost materials for creative projects. Not only that, much of the constantly changing, you-never-know-what-you'll-find inventory is collected from the waste streams of local businesses, thus diverting it from landfills. To date, ACR has helped to keep over 150,000 lbs. of materials out of landfills, putting it instead into the hands of happy customers and educators.

Founder Rebecca Stutch was inspired by reuse stores around the world, and, in particular, The Scrap Exchange in Raleigh where she lived before moving to Austin in 2009. In Austin, she recognized a community dedicated to both the arts and the environment and decided it would be a perfect place for a reuse store. She rounded up fellow conservation enthusiasts and started building relationships with businesses, government agencies, artists and educators. Long before the store opened its doors, volunteers were busy collecting and distributing materials to schools, helping the City of Austin find ways to reach its Zero Waste goals, raising awareness about conscious consumption and sustainability, and building up a mailing list of supporters.



In September of 2015 ACR finally realized its dream of opening a brick and mortar location at The Linc, near Highland Mall. Now after 4 1/2 years, ACR is ready to grow to the next level and is well positioned to reach toward its mission of **fostering conservation and reuse through creativity, education, and community building**.

With the much larger space in the new location, ACR will be able to expand its inventory and focus even more on the community building aspect of their vision. There will be a meeting space where organizations focused on conservation and reuse can meet. Classroom space will make it possible to offer more Art of Reuse and Art of Repair classes as well as more children's programming (a big priority right now). The fenced-in outdoor space will be used for community events, including the annual ZeroLandfill event where artists, art educators, and the general public can pick up free remnants and expired samples donated by architecture and design firms. ACR will be seeking ways to connect to and engage with the neighborhood. If you have ideas, you can send them in an email to info@austincreativereuse.org. In the meantime, here are some ways you can get involved:

- **Donate**: Of course, art and craft supplies are always welcome, but in addition Board President Carole LeClaire suggests that people think outside the box when it comes to making donations. You may not need those bottle caps and corks, but they might be just the thing for someone else's project. On ACR's website are lists of items they do and don't accept.
- **Volunteer**: "Open volunteers" show up for special events or organized volunteer activities. (Parents and children aged 10 and up can even volunteer together.) "Core Volunteers" receive an orientation training and a background check. Then ACR staff members help them to find a niche that suits their interest and personality. And if you catch the bug and want to do even more, you can look into joining a committee.
- Stay informed and spread the word: Join ACR on social media (Facebook, Instagram, email listserv) and let others know about the organization.
- **Shop** (of course). That one's easy. See you in the aisles.

The March winner is Ann Meredith of 5510 Exeter Drive. When we walked up to the door, she seemed a little suspicious of us. Telling her that we wanted her front yard to be the March Yard of the Month must have pleased her because she replied, "You made my day!" Ann has gotten ideas from her sister, friends, "Central Texas Gardener", the Wildflower Center, and the Agrilife Extension Service. She is a member of Gardening 101 in Central Texas on Facebook and takes classes at the Natural Gardener. Ann recommends that the new gardener just jump in. The novice can find out much by taking free classes, talking to experts at nurseries, and talking to friends. It helps to keep a gardening journal.

She has a Sycamore and a Monterrey Oak as well as Mountain Laurels, Rose Bushes including Knockout and Old Blush. and a row of Yaupon Hollies by the retaining wall separating her property from her neighbor. A Daffodil was shyly blooming under a mountain laurel. Near her house, Ann has Skyflower, Bougainvillea, Mexican Honeysuckle, Aztec Grass, Esperanza, Star Jasmine, Plumbago, Oleander, and Elephant Ears. Many of her flowers are in her rain garden to the right of her sidewalk. They include Mexican Heather, pink and red Salvia Greggii, and other Salvias, Gregg's Mistflower, Society Garlic, Rosemary, Cilantro, Celery, Peppers and Yarrow. A large rock diverts the rainwater.

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MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR - C.C. Rowe

Our neighbor on Ridgemont since 2017, C.C. competes in duathlons for fun and has a dual career as a running coach and a sign language interpreter. But many folks in Windsor Park know her as the volunteer delivery runner for the Buy Nothing Windsor Park Facebook group. Having said that I have a lot to explain: a duathlon is a race where you run, then bike, then run. A sign language interpreter helps the deaf with doctors' appointments, legal issues, high tech meetings, etc. The Buy Nothing group is for anyone who wants to give away items they no longer need, and conversely, receive items they may want, for free. It's a neighborhood clearing house that eliminates the garage sale as your chief decluttering

agent. C.C. became a Buy Nothing member last year (anyone can sign up through Facebook)

houses in the dark. I'm just waiting for someone to call the police!"

and discovered people are on this platform all the time and items are crisscrossing the neighborhood every day, which is something C.C. does as she trains for her next race. In the interest of giving herself plenty of mileage to run, C.C. began coordinating the movement of free stuff (that can fit into a backpack) from house to house across Windsor Park. She developed a delivery map of WP, with a course designed to go in a big circle with all the stops coordinated to get items from point A to point B and efficiently cover her 4 to 6 mile run. "I love getting to meet my neighbors doing the deliveries. Windsor Park is a place where neighbors really care about each other." Since her runs are often at 6am, she is usually making deliveries on front porches in her training gear before the sun comes up. "I know it looks strange, running up to random

C.C. started competing in triathlons in 2004 (run-bike-swim). "I was a bike commuter at the time, and a swimmer in high school. I didn't train for the race. I crossed the finish line and said I'm doing this again!" From there she went big. "I runwalked my first marathon in 6 hours 42 minutes and decided to do it faster." Her next marathon clocked in at 5 hours 40 minutes. C.C. was officially bitten by the competition bug. In 2013 she won her first age group duathlon and took it to the next level, eventually making the USA Duathlon Team and competed at the world championship in Spain. "My goal was to not finish last!" She finished third from last.

2018 was a big year for C.C. because she competed in her first Iron Man race (2.4 mile swim - 112 mile bike - 26.2 mile run). "Iron Man is for seriously deranged people" she notes. Her time was 14 hours 55 minutes. She decided to try again. "I

did the second Iron Man because I wanted the jacket" given to race participants. She finished in 13 hours seven minutes. C.C. ran the Austin Marathon in February because she needed a 26-mile training run in her routine of preparing for a 69 mile ultramarathon later this year called "Possum's Revenge" held at Possum Kingdom in North Texas. "I'm doing the race because I like the belt buckle" being given to the finishers.

Back in 1999 C.C. met some deaf people in a bar and was inspired to take a sign language class at ACC, which turned into an associate's degree and a career. "Austin has the largest deaf community in America" she says bluntly. There are a lot of people in government, technology and medicine who need translation services.



Having lived in Hyde Park for almost two decades, C.C. decided to move to Windsor Park three years ago. "The first thing I noticed was the neighbors being so friendly and doing things together. Like the Women of Windsor Park group having lunch....I feel connected to my neighborhood. I love it!" So next time you see someone running up to your neighbor's porch at six in the morning, please don't call the police. It's just C.C. doing her part to replace Amazon.

CLIMATE CORNER – RISING OCEANS AND COMMUNITIES DISSAPPEARING

In the past four years a number of tiny islands in the Pacific have disappeared into a rising ocean. Most were uninhabited atolls. From the Maldives to the Marshall Islands and Christmas Island to Hawaii, as oceans rise, there will be massive displacement of inhabitants in this century. "The tipping point when potable groundwater on the majority of atoll islands will be unavailable is projected to be reached no later than the middle of the 21st century," said Dr Curt Storlazzi, a researcher at the US Geological Survey (USGS).

The planet is already producing climate change refugees, mostly from drought (see: Syria), who are trickling into the cities from parched farm lands. But islanders have a unique problem: they are all threatened equally by rising oceans and the only option is move to a continent. This raises an even larger question: what are the human rights of those displaced by climate change?


Recently a native of Kiribati lost a New Zealand Supreme Court decision to allow him to immigrate on the basis of a right to survival from climate disaster. Kiribati is already drowning and is predicted to be the first inhabited island requiring evacuation from climate change. The NZ court said the man was not under imminent threat, and therefore was deported. Soon, water pollution will seep into his island, followed by disease. And it will be repeated throughout the century - the death knell of many a paradise.

Sea level rise ultimately threatens 1.5 billion people worldwide. Climate science is just now grasping the extent of sea rise based upon new evidence which shows temperature change at the poles is moving exponentially faster than predicted. The new numbers indicate a 20 foot sea rise by the end of the century. Say goodbye to South Florida, the Gulf Coast as we know it, New York City, LA, San Francisco, Boston, you name it.

And thus, dear reader, I ask what your rights are to life, if Austin becomes uninhabitable? These climate events may seem very far away, but not so for your grandchildren. I think Climate Change has become the greatest of human rights issues.
