MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR – Bonnie, Gary and the Catio

A couple years ago Bonnie and Gary, neighbors on Cloverleaf, attended an Audubon Society tour of Austin houses with exterior cat enclosures. For years they had been feeding birds in their "back yard bird sanctuary", but had been thinking about adopting a cat. They viewed the cat patio as a way to have both. "On the tour I saw how they were attaching a structure to the outside of a house and I began to make mental notes on how to do it at our house" Gary recalls.

The idea is simple: build an enclosure outside of a window that allows your cats to go outside without being free to roam about the neighborhood. Some of the examples on the tour were beautiful but were complex structures. There is a carpenter in Austin who specializes in the trade, but Gary knew he could build it, so he set about his yard looking for materials. He wanted their catio to be open air, so his stack of dog fencing once used to corral chickens was the answer. Gary modified the pieces, wired them together, and attached them to their house. Now they were ready to adopt.

They then discovered a local volunteer group called Shadow Cats, which monitors our feral cat population. Their trapneuter-return program puts an end to the cycle of exploding feral cat populations, and their adoption program takes wild cats off the street. Sherlock and Emma were soon in their new home and the catio was a success.




Then Gary got creative and built the Skywalk: a cat sidewalk that reached from the back porch to the top of the privacy fence and 40 feet into the back yard. Made of fence pickets and chicken wire, the Skywalk allows the cats to sunbathe, and watch the bird feeder. "Cat TV" Gary laughs. "The squirrels and birds are used to the cats being out there and now they just look at each other and go about their business" says Bonnie.

As with any adoption, you take on the health and safety of your new family member, and sometimes healthcare can get expensive. Gary adds one final piece of advice: "If you adopt a cat, buy cat insurance. It has saved us thousands of dollars at the vet."

Based upon what I see next door, not only are the birds safe from the cats, but the cats are also safe from predation by dogs and coyotes. "Our catio has a societal contribution" Bonnie notes. I think it's just fun to watch the cats hang out.

April 2021 Mueller Update

Mueller's Southeast Greenway is worth a trip to see if you haven't yet, and more improvements begin construction this month. Go south on Tilley Street from E. 51st 0.8 miles down to Tom Miller, where you'll encounter ponds that are part of Mueller's stormwater management system, and a haven for several species of waterfowl. A trail leads to a curved overlook deck between the two ponds, then continues along the curve of Manor Road across from the Morris Williams Golf Course up to the area where some parking, a skate park and pump track will be added over the next year. A pump track is a looped sequence of swoopy, banked turns, designed to maximize your momentum on anything from skates or wheelchairs to bikes.

Construction is expected to be complete on Austin Energy's new headquarters in May, though due to COVID-19, move in of the anticipated 1000 employees will be phased in over the summer.

The Mueller Commission continues to meet virtually. It was an odd year for real estate in an already crazy market.
