April 2024 Mueller Update

At the March 14th RMMAPIAC meeting, Drew Carman of RVi Planning presented an update some of the last segments of the Mueller loop trail that are now or soon to be underway, including the connection along Zach Scott Street from Manor Road to Tilley, behind and around Marshall Middle School, and along Tannehill Creek between Tilley and Old Manor Road. Completion of these projects is anticipated by the end of 2024. The Tannehill segment is intended to connect to a future trail along the creek from Old Manor through as yet to be developed City parkland, and on the Rathgeber Village property, where it will connect to the Mueller loop at Zach Scott and Manor Road. These areas are not a part of Mueller, and the City of Austin will complete them as funding becomes available

Catellus and the City of Austin are seeking historic designation for the Browning Hangar at 4209 Airport Boulevard.

New businesses opening at Mueller in April include Veracruz All Natural Tacos, next to BD Riley's, and Aviator Pizza, around the corner in the same building, facing Lake Park.



MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR - The Family Hallock, Part III

I have been writing about the Hallock Family for several months and waited until the eleventh hour to write this conclusion. In a major stroke of luck and timing, last night at my daughter's baby shower, I had a chance to speak with Rosie Vines, a 50year family friend of my in-laws, who lit up with a smile at the mention of the Hallock story. It turns out Rosie sang a duet with Gary Hallock in a Gilbert and Sullivan Society production back in the late 70's. "Gary was very young then, but portrayed an old man, all bent over with a cane" she recalls with a laugh.

Rosie had just seen Gary at the G&S annual production party in February and was astonished that I was writing this story. "His mother Enid was a great singer. And have you heard his son? He's an amazing falsetto." Rosie, Gary and Enid were founding members of the Gilbert and Sullivan Society, which annually produces a G&S operetta. "It was great fun" Gary tells me in summation of many stage appearances over the years.

Singing for an audience is a family tradition for the Hallocks. In the late 60's Don learned to play guitar, and teamed up as a folk singing duo with younger brother Gary, performing at coffee shops around Austin. At 17 Gary and older brother Don took the family VW bus on a 16 week tour of America and convinced the Austin American Statesman to publish dispatches every week under the title "Easy Writer." Gary would write the column and Don would create drawings, which made them famous teenagers in Austin. Along the way they joined a traveling carnival sideshow to make extra money and spent a week in jail in Marion, Ohio for contributing to the delinquency of a minor because they helped a 16 year old boy stay out after curfew. Did you say curfew? Things sure are different today.

Meanwhile, father Bruce continued designing and fabricating multiple projects over the 60's, 70's and 80's: the Aero Wing, the Pterodactyl sport plane, and the Motor Rickshaw, all produced in the metal building behind their house on Clayton

Lane. A perfectionist in construction and an innovator in design, Bruce was forever working on big ideas. In 1967 he and Enid bought and refurbished a 1950 Navion aircraft for family use. He was also working as a pilot through the years. His most famous gig was flying LBJ during his 1960 presidential campaign. He also was a pilot for many years for UT's Defense Research Laboratory. He was also President of the Experimental Aircraft Association. Along the way, Bruce and family also hand built an apartment complex on their Clayton Lane property (as previously reported). Bruce had a lot of irons in the fire. He passed in 2005. A few years later Bruce Jr. wrote an appropriately titled book about his father titled Sky Full of Dreams. Gary says two of those planes are now in the experimental aircraft collection of the Smithsonian Institute.

If you missed it before, Gary won the O. Henry Pun-Off World Championship in 1989. "Puns make you a pariah of the comedy world" Gary laments. He formed P.U.N.Y. (Punsters United Nearly Yearly), and produced the O. Henry Pun-Off for 25 years. Somewhere along the way he helped start a competitive punning podcast called Pun Intensive and he has also been writing jokes for Argyle Sweater cartoonist Scott Hillburn for years. The 46th annual O. Henry Pun Off will be held on Saturday May 13 at the Hilton Austin, across the street from the O. Henry Museum.

The Family Hallock has left an indelible mark on many in Windsor Park and across Austin for decades. A construction fence surrounds their hand-built family project apartment complex on Clayton Lane, which will be demolished soon. A unique piece of Austin will be demolished with it.

The April winners are Thom and Lora of 1408 Yorkshire Drive. This is the third time that this address has won Yard of the Month. Lora won in 2005 and she and Thom won in 2012. While we love to honor yards that we have never chosen before, yards are eligible to win again after five years.

In designing their landscape, they followed nature's plan maximizing curves and minimizing sharp corners. They were inspired and got advice from the television program, Central Texas Gardener and from local Master Gardeners. Now many varieties of wildlife visit their yard.

They have Salvia Greggii, Salvia Coerulia, Purple Fountain Grass, Mexican Feather Grass, Shasta Daisy, Dwarf Ruellia, Firecracker Fern, Purple Coneflower, Agapanthus Crocosilila, Sago Palm, Shrimp Plant, Roses, Sedum, and several Succulents. They also have a Cedar Elm Tree and a Red Oak Tree. Many of their plants are in small beds surrounding their trees; others are in large pots near their house.

Thom and Lora have a rain chain and a rain collection system. They advise having a written plan. Having done it on her own before she married Thom, Lora appreciates having a partner to help. They enjoy working together. Also, they say it is extremely helpful to take classes.

Thom and Lora will receive a \$50.00 gift certificate from Shoal Creek Nursery. While you are there be sure to greet Chicago and admire the waterfall.

Cutworms

Granulate cutworms are damaging in the immature, or larval, stage. Cutworms can cut plant seedlings stems off at the soil level and on older plants they can climb the plant and feed on foliage or fruit. Young larvae skeletonize leaves while older larvae eat holes in foliage, feed on the surface of fruit, or burrow into fruit. Larvae are nocturnal, which may make it difficult to discover the culprit of plant damage. You may need to inspect the garden at night when larvae feed.

Eggs are laid singly or in clusters on the upper surface of foliage. Eggs begin white in color, but darken as larvae get close to emerging. Larvae are grayish-red with a brown head and light markings along the side of the body. Larvae start off around ¼" but grow to 1.5" in length. Pupae are in soil and are a dark reddish-brown color. Adults are drab brownish-gray mottled moths with a wingspan around 1.5 inches. The front wings have a bean shaped marking paired with a circular marking.

Granulate cutworms feed on a wide variety of crops including beans, cabbage, peas, celery, watermelon, muskmelon, broccoli, cauliflower, potatoes, lettuce, onions, tomatoes, peppers, spinach, carrots, cucumbers, radish, beets, turnips, and brussel sprouts.

If you have had cutworm problems in previous years, you can till soil before planting to disturb pupae. Plant collars can be used to physically block larvae from clipping new seedlings. Collars can be made from cut sections of PVC pipe, fruit/vegetable cans with both ends cut out, or aluminum foil wrapped around stems of seedlings. A key to using plant collars is that they need to be partially buried in the soil and sticking up from the ground to protect the seedling and block larvae. If you are confident that no pupae are in the soil, row cover can be used to keep adult moths from laying eggs on the leaves of host plants. If eggs or egg clusters are spotted on plant foliage, they can be squished or removed from plants.

Chemical treatment may consist of insecticidal soap on smaller larval stages. Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt) variety kurstaki is a biological product that only targets caterpillars and can help to conserve beneficial predator insects. Another biological product is spinosad which is selectively active on insect pests that feed on foliage. Both Bt and spinosad need to have good coverage on the infested plants as they need to be consumed for them to work. This would also mean that you would need to treat with these products in the evening since cutworm larvae are nocturnal. With any pesticide product, make sure to read and follow all labeled instructions and make sure that it can be used in the area that you plan to treat.

April 2023 WPNA President's Message by Jeanette Swenson

Thank you to all committee chairs who agreed to continue working for Windsor Park. Looking to the future, development and traffic congestion within and exiting Windsor Park will be a continued challenge for all of us. As the 2023 President, I'd like to focus on how we can ease current congestion stresses and look to the future. Each committee offered ways that we can work together to improve mobility in Windsor Park.

Fixing Your City, Creating Thriving Neighborhoods and Adapting to a Changing World by George Crandall argues that the fundamental focus for successful and safe circulation must give the highest priority to pedestrians. Unless that is done, pedestrians will continue to be an afterthought in planning and implementation. How can we as individuals and as part of WPNA shift the focus to mobility, which includes pedestrians, cyclists, mass transit? And, yes automobile traffic will continue to be a part of future planning, but it will not be the principal and only concern for planners and developers.

On another note, community safety continues to be an issue. In the past, Windsor Park had an active Safety Committee. It has lacked leadership, and we hope that some of you will step up to lead the challenge. We do have a volunteer, Steve Speir, who would like to work on the committee, but not lead.

Elizabeth Kubala focused on the importance of community building as an important path to resilience and thriving. What is your micro-community within Windsor Park doing to create a safe, caring, healthy community?

Because Windsor Park lacks safe, family-friendly bike lanes, I hope that representatives of organizations who plan and implement cycling routes will be at the April meeting. Maybe it's the weather, but I've been seeing more cyclists in the neighborhood. I'd love to have a safer route than Briarcliff's narrow and uneven sharrow where I held my breath as a mother, followed by a five-year-old on her bike, made their way west on Briarcliff. Another immediate concern is a safe route to the new Marshall Middle School in Mueller, which would connect to the cycle track on Tilley Street and would hopefully have a pedestrian beacon at E. 51st Street for safer crossing. Where else would you like to see bike lanes? Sidewalks?

Send us your ideas, needs, and achievements as we all work for a safe, community-oriented, environmentally friendly Windsor Park.



A message from the Chair of the Windsor Park Neighborhood Plan Contact Team

We are frequently asked to explain the difference between the Windsor Park Neighborhood Plan Contact Team (WPNPCT) and the Windsor Park Neighborhood Association. This message is being offered to define and distinguish the role of a contact team in zoning changes and changes to a neighborhood plan.

What is a neighborhood plan?

A neighborhood plan identifies the goals and priorities of a neighborhood and creates a roadmap for future development. This can include plans for new parks, transportation improvements, or changes to zoning regulations.

Distinguishing between a contact team and a neighborhood association

A contact team and a neighborhood association are different and separate entities. The City of Austin establishes each contact team at the adoption of a neighborhood plan and has specific requirements regarding its purpose and function. A neighborhood association exists to represent the interests of its members and organizes activities for its purposes and under its direction.

What is a neighborhood plan contact team?

A Neighborhood Plan Contact Team is a volunteer group assigned to be the stewards of an adopted neighborhood plan. The City of Austin requires a contact team as part of the adoption of each neighborhood plan and has requirements about membership, bylaws, and duties. Each Austin neighborhood that has an adopted neighborhood plan has a contact team. The WPNPCT was formed in 2007 when the City Council adopted the Windsor Park Neighborhood Plan.

Windsor Park Neighborhood Plan Contact Team decisionmaking responsibilities

When a proposed development project requires a change to the neighborhood plan, the Plan Amendment process requires the applicant to meet with the contact team for that planning area. The planning area for Windsor Park lies within the boundaries of I-35, 290E, Northeast Drive, Manor Road, and 51st Street. City staff will only schedule a community meeting about the proposed changes once an applicant has communicated with the Contact Team.

The WPNPCT is charged with reviewing and initiating the amendments to the neighborhood plan, working with city staff, and functioning as a community point of contact. It is responsible for communicating with Windsor Park stakeholders, including homeowners, renters, business owners, and development project applicants in the planning area. It may also host development project overview meetings for stakeholders to learn about the design concepts, building plans, and construction timelines of proposed projects. Ten

Windsor Park development projects are currently in process and are yet to come.

The Contact Team is responsible for making well-informed recommendations on proposed plan amendments to the Planning Commission and City Council prior to public hearings. After meeting with applicants and receiving input from residents about the proposed development projects within the planning area, the WPNPCT may submit a letter supporting or opposing the proposed changes to the Planning staff, Planning Commission, or City Council. In some cases, Contact Team members testify at Planning Commission and City Council hearings. Lastly, establishing collaborative and mutually beneficial relationships with applicants to achieve development projects in Windsor Park that provide green space, affordable housing, and commercial and retail services is a significant priority for the group.




