A recently approved equity study that will focus on equity issues among all our AISD schools. 

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

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May 2016 Mueller Update

On April 11, Catellus announced that Texas Mutual Insurance Company, the state's leading workers' compensation insurance provider, will consolidate its Austin offices and move its headquarters and more than 600 employees to Mueller's Aldrich Street District. Catellus will manage the construction of the 4-story, 270,000 s.f. building that will be owned by Texas Mutual. Construction is anticipated to begin in early 2017 with move-in by fall of 2018. Texas Mutual will fully occupy the



building with the exception of approximately 20,000 s.f. of first-floor retail space.

Texas Mutual joins Seton Family Healthcare, American Institutes of Research (formerly SEDL), Dell Children's Medical Center, UT's Dell Pediatric Research Institute, and H-E-B as major employers at Mueller, where an estimated 5,000 people currently work. Catellus estimates more than 13,000 people will work at Mueller upon completion.

Mueller's second community pool, at John Gaines Park on Sorin St. (between Vaughan and Tilley) is scheduled to be open by Memorial Day. Much like Ella Wooten Pool (see more info at http://www.muelleraustinonline.com/pool. php), John Gaines Pool will host Open Swim hours for non-Mueller residents for a small fee.

Aldrich at 51st Street is expected to open by August, and the full-width construction of Berkman Drive continues northward, reaching Simond Avenue in mid-April and expected to be fully complete by October. It's anticipated that a traffic signal will be installed at the Market District driveway by the end of 2016. The City's Transportation Department is also studying the potential for a 4-way stop at Berkman and Zach Scott, though that may have to wait until State-mandated traffic triggers are met. All of these elements are anticipated to slow traffic (the fully-built street width will have narrower lanes) and possible lessen some cut-through traffic. Tilley Street will eventually stretch from Manor Road through Mueller to 51st Street, and Zach Scott Street will connect Airport Boulevard and Manor Road, offering alternative routes for some travelers.

At April's Robert Mueller Municipal Airport Plan Implementation Advisory Commission, Council Member Delia Garza's appointee Michael Jones was re-elected as chair, and Mayor Adler's appointee, yours truly, was re-elected as vice-chair. The next RMMAPIAC meeting is Tuesday, May 10, 2016 at 6PM at Parque Zaragoza Recreation Center, 2608 Gonzales Street. MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR: BOB TOLERO Martin Luecke



Our neighbor on Wight Cove since 1990, Bob Tolero wears a lot of hats in the theater profession here in Austin and around the country. "I'm a dabbler: actor, stage manager, director" says Bob, who currently also is Adjunct Professor at St Edward's University teaching stage management and directing shows. "You gotta love what you do and I -Love - It!"

Most of the time Bob is a stage manager. "Theater is a composite art, it's a village, and a stage manager keeps the village together and communicating" by organizing the entire production, all the schedules for props and sets and costumes and talent. "And then when the show starts, you're in charge of keeping the show tight by calling all the sound cues, all the light cues. Nothing happens unless you tell it to happen. Every night is different because it's live, every audience is different. You almost have to become a character in the play."

Bob has managed many a show and star "from Walter

Cronkite to Willie Nelson!" This statement leads to several very funny stories. (I was there for hours!) Bob was on board with Ray Benson and Asleep at the Wheel when they staged the Bob Wills play "Ride With Bob" that appeared at The Kennedy Center, among many other places. And Oh By The Way, Bob spent two decades stage managing Greater Tuna, working all over America including the bright lights of Broadway. "I bought my house because of Greater Tuna "

Born and raised in Ohio, Bob got the showbiz bug while serving in the army (of all places). He received his Master's Degree in Theater at Trinity University in San Antonio, and spent the next six years at Dallas Theater Center. Bob won an Emmy Award in 1982 for directing a play in Cleveland which was broadcast by PBS and included a cast of deaf and hearing actors where sign language was used alongside spoken word.

His current job is stage managing the hit show at Zach Scott called "Ann", about Ann Richards. Written by Emmy award winning actress Holland Taylor, Bob was there from the beginning six years ago helping Taylor stage the one woman play. Bob actually knew Ann Richards from his days at Paramount Theater in the 80's when Ann would stop by the ticket office and chat and go to movies by herself. "She was so genuine it was like talking with your mother." The play appeared on Broadway in 2013 and earned its star a Tony nomination for best actress. Holland is so convincing in the part that one of Ann Richard's sons had to leave the theater. The A-list of back stage visitors went from Tom Hanks to Meryl Streep. Hillary Clinton came twice, the second time bringing her husband. "Bill Clinton was holding Holland and weeping from what he saw on stage. It was surreal!" No - Wonder - You - Love - It!

Bob is a member of the Actor's Equity Union, but is working lots of different jobs in a year, some lasting a few days, others a few months. "I tell my students: Diversify. Have many skills in your profession because you don't know which ones will get you work."

His next job is stage managing a play at St Edward's, and then directing a play in January for a different company. After "Ann" closes this month Bob is taking a vacation from the hectic pressure of live theater. "That, and fix my roof." Oh the glamour of it all!

Whiteflies

Whiteflies are small, soft bodied insects with piercinging mouthparts. They are creamy white and adults h mealy wax coating their body and wings. Immatures called nymphs, are small, oval, flattened and wingless.

Whitefly populations can increase quickly when terr tures are warmer. The insects like to be on the unders leaves, often in clusters. Common species of whiteflies a wide host range and can switch host plants.

Whiteflies suck plant juices and large populations can cause foliage to turn yellow, appear to be dry or even fall off the plant. Some whiteflies cause plant distortion or foliage to turn silver in color. Whiteflies produce honeydew, a sticky substance secreted by some insects. Honey dew causes foliage to become shiny in appearance and can attract a fungus called sooty mold. Some whiteflies are capable of transmitting plant viruses.

Try to encourage natural enemies to help manage whitefly populations in your garden. To do this, make wise pesticide choices. Try to choose pesticides to target specific pests and/ or specific areas. Also, you may need to manage ants that tend the whiteflies to obtain honeydew. The ants protect whiteflies from natural enemies that may normally keep the pest population at manageable levels.

In vegetable gardens, you may want to try reflective mulches to make the underside of the leaves where whiteflies hide less habitable. As for chemical treatment, you can use high pressure water sprays, insecticidal soap, azadirachtin, d-limonene, botanicals or a synthetic product. Target your treatment to the underside of the leaves to get to where the whiteflies like to hide
