Mueller Update – December 2019

One of the six community-determined goals for Mueller's redevelopment was "Fiscal Responsibility," requiring the redevelopment to create a positive revenue stream to fund on-site infrastructure and increase the City's tax base for the benefit of all citizens. In other words, unless you live in or have a business at Mueller that pays property taxes, or shop at one of its retailers and pay sales tax, Austin resident's property taxes do not contribute to the project. Mueller does contribute to the other taxing entities, like AISD, Travis County, Travis Central Healthcare District, and the Austin Community College District. So far, Mueller has added \$1.4 billion to the tax base, and will begin contributing to the City's general fund once all of its Tax Increment Funding (TIF) bond debt is paid off, expected to be done by 2032. This year the debt payments are \$4.5 million, while the TIF revenue stream is providing \$6.2 million of income. Mueller's financial performance is well above what was anticipated when the City signed the Master Developer Agreement with Catellus back in 2004.

Though the statistics change almost daily, around 3,755 residential units (both homes & apartments) have been built so far at Mueller, and 1,036 of those are in an affordable program, a bit over the 25% required. As for commercial and institutional development, 2.25 million square feet have been constructed; 625,000 sq ft of that is retail.

WPNA and the JJ Seabrook and Mueller Neighborhood Associations submitted supporting resolutions for the Mueller Planned Unit Development (PUD) amendment, which passed on the Planning Commission's consent agenda at its November 12th



's consent agenda at its November 12th meeting. Though posted on the City Council's November 14th agenda, it has been postponed to their December 5th meeting.

The Robert Mueller Municipal Airport Plan Implementation Advisory Commission does not meet in December, but will next meet at 6:00 PM on Tuesday, January 14, 2019 at the Chestnut Community Center, 1183 Chestnut Avenue. Garden Guide: Tree Season!

It's that time. We are in the perfect window to plant a new tree in your yard. There are lots of great local resources such as the City of Austin's *Grow Green Landscape Guide*, as well as knowledgeable folks at garden centers to help you make an informed choice about which tree suits your needs best. *But it is time!*

Here are five "pro tips" to help you find your tree:

- 1) Go to a local garden center to buy your trees. This supports local retailers, wholesalers and growers. The trees come from local seed and cutting stock, are grown with local water, and are best acclimated to our region.
- 2) Be clear on the size and placement of your tree before you go to the garden center. Trees look about the same size when they're for sale, but some trees will grow to 10', while others will attain soaring heights of 60'. A big difference!
- 3) When shopping for your tree, pull trees away from anything holding them up. Does it stand on its own? Pass on any tree that will require staking to stay up, as staked trees are at a disadvantage from day one.
- 4) Pull away any debris on the surface of the pot near the trunk. If a tree has many roots growing in a circular shape ("pot-bound"), pass on that one too. You can correct minor circling, but if big, woody roots have begun to encircle the trunk, they might eventually choke the thickening trunk, causing a tree's failure. This is called "girdling." According to Guy LeBlanc, a local arborist, this is the most common reason for trees failing in our area.
- 5) The tree you choose will likely be there for decades, maybe even centuries. Include the whole family in the process. Commemorate a special moment or special person with the tree's new start, and take pictures! You'll be surprised at how much the tree means to you, and how it will evoke a shared moment and a special significance over time.

MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR - The JJ Refugee Family Update

One year ago, Windsor Park met the Jaqueline and Joas family through this column, and the subsequent outpouring of support was legendary. We took an empty house and filled it with everything one needs to run a household of eight. The family is so grateful for the Windsor Park welcome and support.

The past six months have seen the family move to a less expensive apartment, across the street from the company that employs both parents. They are lucky to have jobs, but it is not easy work and sometimes they do not have full work weeks. They are receiving help with government food program SNAP, so no one is going hungry.

Four of the six sons are in school. The oldest son Ishara is mentally handicapped, so his brother Muhire stays home all day to protect him from getting hurt. What's amazing is that Muhire is ok with this assignment; at 20 years old, he could be doing something else. The 18-year-old Elize is doing well in school and learning English the best, and acts as translator these days. He tells me he wants to go into construction – the construction program at ACC is his goal.

Innocent, Jules and Joshua are the youngest boys and are regular American kids, playing lots of music and games on their phones and laptop from school. They are into soccer and cool sneakers like most young boys, but I don't know if school is really reaching them. Their English is coming along slowly; mostly because Kinyarwanda is so completely different from English.

For a recent adventure, we went to San Antonio for a dose of Texas history and their first Tex-Mex meal on the river walk. We speak in small words, trying to convey complicated information as simply as possible. The Alamo is "a famous battle place", and the "oldest church in Texas." Explaining the concept of ultimate sacrifice for the sake of country is just not possible, and they've never heard of John Wayne. Joas asked me to take his photo next to a tree that has a cousin in Africa. As we walked through the gardens, Elize pointed to a large green leafed decorative plant and said it is food in Rwanda.



Over the past 5 months, I have been teaching three of the boys to drive and Elize is good enough to drive on the streets. He earned his driver's license and is ready to provide badly needed transportation for the family, but at his



age, car insurance is very expensive, something the family cannot afford. Ironically, if he had the van he could go to work in the afternoons and make enough money to pay the insurance.

For Christmas this year it would be great to raise money to buy the family six

months to a year of auto insurance and get them started down the road to real self-sufficiency. We're talking about three to four thousand dollars here, not a small thing. The other most needed item is a vacuum cleaner and house shoes for everyone. Their native land is so much warmer than Austin the family is perpetually cold, so comfy house shoes will go a long way.
