### December 2017 Yard of the Month

The December Yard of the Month is 1616 Ashberry Drive. This is a repeat winner. Yards are eligible to win again after five years. The owners, Homero Sanchez and Karen Gustafson who won in 2010, had to move to California for family reasons. Their house is rented to college students and managed by Charlee Peate.

Their yard looked good in 2010, and it still looks good. Back then they were inspired by other xeriscaped yards, parks, and local businesses. Then they advised beginning gardeners to research to do some research before planting anything. That is still good advice. In the late summer and early fall of 2009 Karen and Homero worked with a landscaper to develop an attractive design that would reduce water use and require little work.

This is definitely a xeriscape. Homero and Karen wanted a landscape that complemented their mid-century modern house. On the Berkman side of the yard there is grass. The rest is crushed limestone with mulched planting beds. The rust colored metal planters add color. In the planters they have Golden Barrel Cacti and Mexican Feather Grass. By the house they have Bamboo Muhly. They also have Blue Agave, Toothless Sotol, Shoestring Acacia, and Red Yucca. These plants require little care. The main jobs are weeding and blowing leaves in the fall. The leaves come from a mature tree in the middle of the front yard. The pale green of many of their plants complement the grey house with the red front door.




### **Carpet Beetles**

Carpet beetles can be found outdoors on crape myrtles or other plants where the adults eat pollen and nectar; the adults may also be found in rodent or bird nests. When these adults move into homes, they lay eggs which can lead to problems. These beetles can be pests in warehouses, homes, museums and other locations.

Carpet beetle adults are small, round to oval shaped and often brightly colored. Larvae are small, tan, and ringed with bands of long hairs. Carpet beetle larvae feed on high protein foods, usually animal based, but they can also feed on plant material. In the pantry, you may find them in items such as powdered milk, dried meats (jerky), or pet food. In other areas of the home, they can be attracted to items made from wool, fur or feathers, areas where dead insects accumulate (i.e. light fixtures), leather book bindings, hair, silk or dried plant products.



A program utilizing sanitation, exclusion and insecticides should be able to get a carpet beetle problem under control.

- Clean accumulations of hair, dead insects, and bird, rodent or wasp nests
- Regularly clean rugs, carpets, upholstery, etc.
- Inspect animal based items (leather, wool, silk, taxidermied animals, etc.) once a year to avoid infestations
- Keep pantry items/ dry goods in sealed, air-tight containers

• Infested items can be heated or cooled to kill any beetles, depending on the item. Freeze 2 weeks at temperatures below 18°F or heat for at least 30 minutes to temperatures above 120°F

• Insecticides can be used as spot treatments - make sure carpet beetles are listed on the label and treat a small spot first to ensure the product will not stain

If you find a few adult carpet beetles in your home, squish them or vacuum them up. A few adults usually do not warrant a full treatment, but you should watch for a developing infestation.

#### **December 2017 Mueller Update** *Rick Krivoniak*

The 11th annual NOEL Mueller Tower Lighting on will be held on Tuesday, December 5th from 5:30 to 7:30 PM. The celebration, with live music, a dance floor, treats and hot drinks, will be held at John Gaines Park. Easiest access from Windsor Park is to take the easternmost driveway on 51<sup>st</sup> Street into the HEB parking lot and continue directly south onto Vaughan Street about onehalf mile to Sorin Street, at the southwest corner of the park. The City Council will adopt the 2015 International Fire Code for Austin in December, excluding the portions that might require 25-foot clear street travel widths, which as reported last month, would affect many Mueller and other central Austin neighborhoods. The City will engage in a series of meetings for public and expert input before the Council decides on the final policy sometime in early 2018.

Mueller has the largest concentration of Austin Energy Green Building rated structures. AEGB has awarded star ratings to the homes and businesses here for being resource-wise contributors to a cleaner environment through efficient energy and water use, better health and greater comfort. The event was held at the Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central Texas Mentoring Center, located in the Rathgeber Village section of Windsor Park, which was also awarded an Austin Energy Green Building 3-star rating the same evening.

Recently, the AISD Performing Arts Center (PAC) received recognition for its LEED Gold rating by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC), making the PAC the 15th LEED building in Mueller. This is on top of its five-star rating from the Austin Energy Green Building program.

Family violence is a complicated problem. World Health Organization research shows there are many factors, all inter-related, including poverty, lack of green space, lack of access to healthcare, toxic waste, racism, and inequity which are contributing factors to chronic health and violence in a community.

María is speaking to me from Spokane where she spent a week training the Washington family violence team on a new program invented here in Austin designed to get families to look at how society perpetuates domestic violence. "We have found a way to present the content which encourages reflection and honesty and even joy and light-heartedness." The curriculum requires a particular facilitation style that is light and fun, because "otherwise it's too heavy a topic." The results are promising.

María says, "Domestic violence is a very

gendered problem: men are conditioned to believe their role is to be dominant; women are conditioned to believe they are subservient. We are trying to break down those belief systems so we can end violence without demonizing the aggressors." It takes a reinvention of thought in the family unit, where change happens incrementally.

María's next training session here in Austin is open to the public and will happen January 24-26 at the Sustainable Food Center on East 17th St. Contact Mária at <u>mlimon@tcfv.org</u> if you wish to participate.
