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Fungus gnats

Fungus gnats often become a problem in homes due to an overwatering problem. Since this time of year can bring poinsettias or other plants into the home, fungus gnats are a pest to watch for.

Fungus gnat adults are small, black, long-legged flies with long antennae. Most adults are about 1/16 an inch but some can get up to ½ an inch. They are weak fliers and generally remain near potted plants, growing media, foliage or leaf litter.

Larvae, or immatures, have a black head capsule and long whitish body without legs. They feed on organic matter such as mulch, compost, grass clippings, plant roots and fungi. When conditions are very moist, fungus gnat larvae can become abundant and may leave slime trails on media that looks similar to trails left by snails or slugs.

While these gnats are a nuisance they are fairly easy to manage. Indoors, it is a good idea to use yellow sticky cards as a monitoring tool. Potato pieces may also be used as a monitoring tool for fungus gnats. To do this, imbed a peeled potato cube into media and inspect the underside of the potato and the media directly below it twice a week for fungus gnat larvae.

To manage fungus gnat populations, work on reducing excessively moist conditions. Avoid overwatering and make sure that there is good drainage. The surface of container soil should be allowed to dry before watering again. If using compost, make sure that items have been fully composted. Compost piles should be turned regularly and kept away from doors or windows. Inspect all doors, windows, vents and screens for a good seal to reduce the number of gnats that may enter a structure.

Bacillus thuringiensis var. *israelensis* or the nematode *Steinernema feltiae* can be applied in containers to control larvae. Either spray on the media or apply as a soil drench. Biologicals work best when they are applied early in an infestation. If a population is already large, they may not provide the control desired.

The last year has been a successful year for the Austin City Council. 2016 was my sophomore year in office and we have learned a lot about a lot in two years. We look forward to continuing to serve everyone in District #1!

Last year, the Health and Human Services Council Committee worked hard to establish the ability for Code Inspectors to register/license and inspect boarding homes where 7 or more unrelated individuals live to ensure that their housing is safe. Many people in District #1 expressed concern about the well-being of some of our most vulnerable. My goal as the first council person for District #1 was to spend a lot of time reaching out to and connecting with individuals in the community who have been marginalized and feel that they are not heard by City staff or prior council. It was important to establish a line of communication between individuals in the district and City staff to respond directly to issues that affect their quality of life.

Our office also made sure to partner with other agencies and entities to foster a positive working relationship. For example, we partnered with the Texas Department of Transportation to pave and restripe East Martin Luther King Jr., Blvd. from Airport Blvd. to the access road of Hwy 183. We also supported budget items for commissions whose work relates to disparities and inequities in contracts, economic infrastructure, employment, education, housing, language access and healthcare in the City of Austin for certain populations.

Throughout 2017, we hope to bring focus on the lack of equity in policy decisions, budget allocations on advisory groups and the implementation of procedures in City Departments; to encourage Central Health to extend primary health care to communities that are East of Airport Blvd., to the Travis County line; and legacy issues and length of agreements with those entities.

We will continue to host our quarterly Town Hall meetings and Coffee Chats throughout the district. In 2016, we also hosted several special-called Town Hall meetings to address pressing items and allow the community to participate. MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR: AMERICAN BOTANICAL COUNCIL, part 2

Our neighbor headquartered at the 1850 Case Mill Homestead on Walnut Hills Drive and Manor Road since 1998, ABC is a nonprofit herbal education organization founded by Executive Director Mark Blumenthal in 1988. With members in 81 countries, from growers to health care providers, ABC is the world’s largest source of herbal ethnobotanical scientific information, including essential oils and fungi. Their mission statement: promote the responsible use of herbal medicine.

There are several ways ABC achieves this goal: publishing books and magazines; publishing on the internet (www.herbalgram.org); and traveling the world speaking to conferences. Mark just returned from doing four appearances in Israel. With 18 full time staff, a cadre of consultants, authors and researchers, ABC provides eight searchable databases online containing the latest scientific data on everything from Acerola to Yaupon Holly. Peer reviewed and written at a high scientific level, ABC is the clearing house for the medicinal and therapeutic use of herbs, and regularly consults federal and state agencies like the FDA and the DEA. In other words, ABC helps make policy.



Mark says the biggest myth of the supplement industry is that it is not regulated by the FDA. In fact, the FDA website says: FDA regulates both finished dietary supplement products and dietary ingredients. FDA regulates dietary supplements under a different set of regulations than those covering “conventional” foods and drug products. Under the Dietary Supplement Health and Education Act of 1994 (DSHEA):

- Manufacturers and distributors of dietary supplements and dietary ingredients are prohibited from marketing products that are adulterated or misbranded. That means that these firms are responsible for evaluating the safety and labeling of their products before marketing to ensure that they meet all the requirements of DSHEA and FDA regulations.
- FDA is responsible for taking action against any adulterated or misbranded dietary supplement product after it reaches the market.

ABC’s big initiative at the moment is the botanical adulteration education project. Just like it sounds, ABC is leading the charge in uncovering the “adulteration” of different products through scientific research, guiding manufacturers on which source materials meet FDA regulations. Partners in the education project include the American Herbal Pharmacopoeia (AHP), and the University of Mississippi’s National Center for Natural Products Research (NCNPR).

This is important stuff Windsor Park. Our neighbor is helping keep us safe. And in the pantheon of humanity, herbs are in the top 3 list along with water and food. Civilization was founded on homo sapiens’ ability to cultivate nutrition sources in predictable

cycles, and hunter gatherer clans survive to this day precisely because of their herbal knowledge. ABC is doing this job for us. And we, in this modern society, take for granted our easy access to these products of nature. Few of us could actually find in nature the herbs required to treat illnesses. And most of us are unaware of the many uses of these herbs in our daily lives. Tea is the primary intersection of humans and herbs in the world today. Chinese Emperor Shen-Nung is credited with accidentally inventing herb tea in 2737 B.C.

So five thousand years of global herbal data is now available to anyone who wants to join ABC. As a member you too can ‘Adopt-An-Herb’, ABC’s program which, according to their web site: “helps ensure that the most current information on their herb is available in HerbMedPro. This enables consumers, researchers, educators, media, health practitioners, government agencies, and members of industry to have easy access to abstracts of the latest scientific and clinical publications on the many aspects, properties, and benefits of the adopted herb.” I can see the family photo now: me with my new adoptee, Stinging Nettle, sitting in the garden! 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program, which was approved by Austin voters last month. These dollars are slated to transform areas like North Lamar, Airport, and Burnet Road to be friendlier for pedestrians, bicyclists, neighbors, small businesses, and drivers alike. We’ll also begin construction of many of the City’s highest priority sidewalks as soon as we can.

Update on APD DNA Lab

As I’ve shared with you, our office has been working for the past several months to address the challenges facing the Austin Police Department’s DNA lab, which closed earlier this year after an audit by the Texas Forensic Science Commission revealed poor scientific protocols and a lack of transparency. During the City budget process, we secured a commitment to send backlogged sexual assault exam kits out to other labs for testing, and we tasked the City Manager’s office to review the operation of the APD lab and to consider the formation of a lab independent from the City because of the serious concerns related to procedural and scientific issues at the APD lab.

Now, City and County officials are working together to ensure that a thorough scientific review of the practices at the lab is completed, along with a thorough legal review of the cases where people were convicted of crimes using evidence processed by the lab. City and County officials are also working together on a process to determine the best leadership structure for the lab in the future to ensure transparency and effective forensic services.

My highest priority in these areas is the pursuit of justice and I am committed to ensuring that evidence in Austin is processed swiftly and with appropriate safeguards to ensure accuracy. We can and must do better.

January 2017 Mueller Update

Due to mud concerns adjacent to the Tower, the December 6th Tower Lighting event was moved last minute to John Gaines Park, which served as an excellent venue for the 11th NOEL re-lighting ceremony. The Reagan High School Drum Line and the Nash Hernandez Orchestra provided a festive atmosphere, and State Rep. Celia Israel threw the switch to light the NOEL for the holiday season.

Though a large amount of infrastructure was already in place, it was just ten years ago this month that the first six home-builders at Mueller were announced, leading to the first residents moving in just before the end of 2007. No stores were open yet in Mueller, and Dell Children’s Medical Center was still a few months away from taking in its first patients. Mueller’s redevelopment is now roughly at its halfway point, having survived the 2008-2010 recession with a slowdown. Currently developing at fast pace, expect some exciting things at Mueller for 2017.

Weather permitting; the full width of Berkman Drive through Mueller should soon be open. Narrow traffic lanes, a median, parallel parking and cycle-tracks in the street’s cross-section are designed to create “friction” and slow traffic. Past speed and safety concerns on Berkman led the City’s Transportation Department to try “dynamic speed display” signs, showing the speed of approaching cars atop the posted speed limit. The signs will rotate around the city, as studies indicate their effectiveness wanes with time, but initial findings did show that speeds were reduced on the southern stretch of Berkman. A new 4-Way stop at Zach Scott Street is also anticipated to slow speeders. Pedestrian activated, rapid flashing beacon crossing signals are being considered for two locations on Berkman.

With the newly elected City Council Members D6 Flannigan and D10 Alter, and with two commissioner resignations (by D5 CM Kitchen & D9 CM Tovo), four appointments to the Robert Mueller Municipal Airport Plan Implementation Advisory Commission will be made by the end of February. Unlike most City commissions, RMMAPIAC members must reside in Mueller or in nearby neighborhoods. Windsor Park residents Martin Lueke (by CM D4 Casar), and yours truly (by Mayor Adler) will continue to serve two more years. If you have an interest in serving on any City board or commission, visit www.austintexas.gov/departments/boards-and-commissions.

Recent communications to the City Council by the RMMAPIAC include: A recommendation to consider potential City use and funding for Mueller Central, the Hangar and the Tower; encouraging the Council to ask that the Capital Metro Connections 2025 study consider high frequency options along primary corridors in and near the Mueller area; and a recommendation to pursue State legislation allowing cities the option of reducing neighborhood speed limits and implementing a pilot project at Mueller.

The RMMAPIAC (Mueller Commission) will next meet on Tuesday, January 10, 2017 at 6:00 PM at Parque Zaragoza Recreation Center, 2608 Gonzales Street. Schools - Changes Are a’Comin’

There are a lot of changes happening districtwide that will be affecting our neighborhood schools. The school that will be built in Mueller is still an ongoing topic of discussion. Most of the community members who have attended planning sessions with AISD expressed the desire for a middle school to be built there, perhaps the only co-ed option near our neighborhood, which would pull students from all around District 1. However, recently AISD announced its plans to make the Mueller school an elementary, to replace Pecan Springs.



Another issue to keep on your radar are the results from the AISD Facility Condition Assessment, accessible on the AISD website here: https://aecomconnect.com/AISD_FCA/ AISD has been conducting these assessments on every school in the district over the past few months. This is to help inform the work of the Facilities and Bond Planning Advisory Committee (FABPAC). They are designing a comprehensive plan for the needs of district schools ahead of a bond that will be proposed in next fall’s election. Their mission is to not only address urgent needs in facilities, but also to come up with a long-term plan for AISD schools to stay ahead of problems. Please check the website to see the status and recommendations for your school. While it lies on the edge of our neighborhood, we should also be watching for proposals to move LASA out of LBJ and out of District 1 entirely. There have been ongoing issues there with sharing the space and concerns about the inequities and lack of diversity. AISD has recently added changes to its magnet school application, to allow for greater diversity in students attending AISD schools. There will be a two-pronged selection process - one that continues to select students in the usual way, based on scores, essays, grades, etc; and another one that will ensure equity in geographic distribution of students attending LASA. This helps address the problem that LASA, while based in our district, doesn’t serve many of our students. In 2014-15, only 1.7% of its students came from the LBJ attendance zone and 5% from Reagan, while 21% and 19% came from the Bowie and Austin High attendance zones, respectively. Some people feel the challenges facing the shared space of LASA and LBJ would go away if LASA moves to another school building, but this would move it out of District 1, reducing our neighborhood’s access to high-achieving schools.

Moving forward, we might want to explore these issues as a neighborhood and address AISD directly with our desires and hopes for the future of our schools..
